

Subject: Treasurer's Report for the Quarter Ending December 31, 2017

Background

The City's Finance Department is responsible for managing the cash and investment portfolio for the City, Successor Agency for the Paramount Redevelopment Agency, and Paramount Housing Authority. All funds are invested according to Section 53601 of the California Government Code and the City's Investment Policy, which is annually revised and approved by the City Council.

Cash Management Objectives

The City's investment objectives are to preserve the safety of funds and to maintain an adequate level of liquidity to meet anticipated expenditure demands. Investments are made in short term instruments where they earn competitive yields while maintaining safety and liquidity as primary objectives. As of December 31, 2017, total cash and investments equaled \$25,850,505. Of this amount, \$24,249,306 has same day liquidity. This comfortably ensures that sufficient funds are available to meet the City's expenditure requirements for at least the next six months. As of December 31, 2017, the investments held by the City had a market value of \$20,757,192.

Compliance

All investment transactions have been executed in conformance and compliance with the City's adopted annual investment policy and California Government Codes. This report satisfies the reporting requirements of both the Government Code and the City's Investment Policy.

Recommended Action

It is recommended that the City Council receive and file this report.

Subject: APPROVAL OF AMENDMENT NO. 1 TO MEASURE R FUNDING AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN CITY OF PARAMOUNT AND THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY METROPOLITIAN TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY FOR GARFIELD AVENUE STREET IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT FROM 70TH STREET TO HOWERY STREET

On March 17, 2015, the City Council approved the Measure R Funding Agreement with the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (METRO) for the design and environmental clearance work for the Garfield Avenue street improvement project from 70th Street to Howery Street in the amount of \$2,025,000. The scope of work included \$1,725,000 for design and environmental clearance and \$300,000 for utility design. The attached Amendment No. 1 to Measure R Funding Agreement is for the increase for utility design costs from Southern California Edison (SCE) for the undergrounding of both transmission and distribution electrical lines. The increase requested by SCE is \$700,000 to cover the final design of the transmission and distribution systems which have proven to be more complex than Edison's original design estimate to complete.

The Garfield Avenue street improvements project will consist of widening the street to accommodate three (3) travel lanes in each direction, dual left turn lanes in all directions at Rosecrans Avenue and Alondra Boulevard, additional medians, underground of overhead utilities, and resurfacing. The estimated total project cost is approximately \$40,000,000, all of which is eligible for funding from the I-710 Measure R Early Action Program funds or possible other outside funding sources.

The attached Amendment No. 1 to Measure R Funding Agreement stipulates the requirements for the City of Paramount to follow for reimbursement of expended costs incurred in the final design phase of the project. This phase will take approximately 6 months to complete. After completion of the final design phase, staff will apply for additional early action funding as well as explore other funding options to fund the construction phase of this project.

Recommended Action

It is recommended that the City Council approve Amendment No. 1 to Measure R funding agreement by and between City of Paramount and the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority for Garfield Avenue street improvements project from 70th Street to Howery Street in the sum of \$750,000 and authorize the Mayor to execute the agreement.

AMENDMENT No.1 TO MEASURE R FUNDING AGREEMENT BETWEEN CITY OF PARAMOUNT AND THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY METROPOLITAN TRANSPORTATION AUTHORITY

This Amendment No. 1 to the Funding Agreement (this "Amendment"), is dated as of November 2, 2017 by and between the City of Paramount ("Grantee") and the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority ("LACMTA").

RECITALS:

A. Grantee and LACMTA entered into that certain Funding Agreement No. MR306.32 dated January 9, 2015, (the "Existing FA"), which Existing FA provides for the Garfield Avenue Improvements, Project (the "Project"); and

B. WHEREAS, the Grantee desires to increase the Project's budget of Measure R by \$750,000 from \$2,075,000 to \$2,825,000. This amount is within the Board authorized budget increase for the Project: the total new Project budget is \$2,825,0000 which was approved by the LACMTA Board on October 26, 2017 and

C. WHEREAS, the Funds are currently programmed for the Project as follows: \$1,625,000 in Measure R Funds in FY 2014-15, \$450,000 in Measure R Funds in FY 2015-16 and \$750,000 in Measure R Funds in FY 2017-18. The total designated amount for the Project is \$2,825,000; and

D. Grantee and LACMTA desire to amend the Existing FA as provided herein.

AGREEMENT:

NOW, THEREFORE, for good and valuable consideration, the receipt and adequacy of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties hereby agree as follows:

1. Part I, Paragraph 2.2 of the Existing FA is hereby amended by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following: "To the extent the Measure R funds are available, LACMTA shall make to GRANTEE a grant of the Measure R funds in the amount of \$2,825,000 (the "Funds") for the Project. LACMTA Board of Directors actions on October 23, 2014 and October 26, 2017 granted the Measure R Funds for the Project. The Funds are currently programmed in the following Fiscal Years: \$1,625,000 in FY 2014-15; \$450,000 in FY 2015-16; and \$750,000 in FY 2017-18."

2. Part II, Section 9.1 (v) of the Existing FA is hereby amended by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following: "(v) within **five years or 60 months** from July 1 of the Fiscal Year in which the Funds are programmed, unless otherwise stated in this FA. All Funds programmed for FY2014-15 are subject to lapse by June 30, 2019. All Funds programmed for FY2017-18 are subject to lapse by June 30, 2020. All Funds programmed for FY2017-18 are subject to lapse by June 30, 2022."

Garfield Avenue Improvements from 70th Street to Howery Street.

PROJECT LOCATION:

The project is located in the City of Paramount.

PROJECT LIMITS:

This project is on Garfield Avenue from 70th Street to Howery Street.

NEXUS TO HIGHWAY OPERATION DEFINITION/PROJECT PURPOSE:

The purpose of this project is to improve traffic flow in a "hot spot," identified as a chronically congested area attributed to increased passenger car and truck traffic and localized design, capacity, and operational deficiencies.

SCOPE:

I. Preliminary Design

"Consultant" and/or "Lead Agency" Staff to perform the following tasks:

- **A.** Account for field visits of the project area to identify design issues. Record existing site conditions in photographs and/or video. Consultant and Lead Agency
- **B**. Read, review, and understand all aspects and goals of the Lead Agency's General Plan Circulation Element and other plans, as these plans pertain to the intersection improvements contemplated by this project. Consultant and Lead Agency
- C. Provide layout plans to be incorporated into the final design. Consultant
- D. Provide a complete survey of the project area, establishing horizontal and vertical control for the project. Mapping shall include topographic features within 50 feet of project area. Consultant
- E. Identify and coordinate with all utilities in the project area to facilitate the final design of the Project. Consultant and Lead Agency
- F. Conduct any necessary geotechnical investigations of Garfield Avenue. Consultant
- **G.** Identify right-of-way acquisitions and/or vacations to provide for the optimal alignment of roadways in the project area, which shall incorporate roadway widening, development build-outs, and preservation of existing improvements and scenic character of the area, as needed. Consultant and Lead Agency

- H. Identify street pavement structural sections for project area. Consultant
- Identify all drainage/BMP structure improvements, based upon hydrology, hydraulic calculations, and water quality issues. (Structural BMPs shall be incorporated into the street design for stormwater quality improvements prior to entering natural waterways.) Consultant
- J. Prepare and submit a report identifying the ultimate alignment of roadway improvements, as well as the recommended ultimate repair strategy. As part of the Report, prepare and provide CAD drawings of the proposed alignment, including vertical and horizontal alignment, improvements, and drainage/BMP structures. Right-of-way acquisitions and/or vacations shall be clearly identified. Consultant and Lead Agency

- F. Prepare a Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP). Consultant
- **G.** Coordinate with the City and prepare permit applications/notifications for the Project as applicable. Consultant and Lead Agency

III. Final Design – Plans, Specifications and Estimates

- A. Design the ultimate build out and repair strategy for Garfield Avenue, based on the City reviewed "Summary Letter Report." Consultant and Lead Agency
- B. Prepare civil roadway plans for the required improvements, consistent with City format. At a minimum, the plan set shall include Title Sheet, Site Plan, General Construction Notes, Horizontal Control, Typical Sections and Details, Plan and Profile, Drainage/BMP Structure(s) Details, Traffic Striping/Signage/Signal Plans, Street Lighting/Electrical, Bike Lane Plans, and Median/Landscaping Plans. Consultant and Lead Agency
- **C.** Submittal of plan set shall be delivered at 50% and 90% complete and final (five (5) sets per submittal). When project is complete, the Consultant shall provide AutoCAD files for all plan sheets. Consultant
- D. Assist the City for the Community Information Workshop after the 90% submittal by preparing exhibits and attending workshop and be prepared to discuss concerns of the property owners along Garfield Avenue, particularly with issues of right-of-way acquisition. Consultant and Lead Agency
- E. Prepare construction specifications consistent with City format (SSPWC "Greenbook" APWA, current edition with updates. Consultant and Lead Agency





Subject: Ordinance No. 1098/Zoning Ordinance Text Amendment No. 9 – Marijuana (Cannabis) Operations, Uses, and Activities

Request

This item is a request for City Council adoption of a zoning ordinance text amendment (ZOTA) regarding marijuana (cannabis) operations, uses, and activities, applicable citywide, including the prohibition of the outdoor cultivation of marijuana and establishment of regulations for personal indoor residential cultivation of marijuana in compliance with the State of California Medicinal and Adult-Use Cannabis Regulation and Safety Act (MAUCRSA).

The proposed ordinance is presented to reaffirm and clarify the current City of Paramount commercial marijuana prohibition and establish local regulations for residential marijuana cultivation. In the wake of California voter approval on November 9, 2016 of Proposition 64, also known as the Control, Regulate and Tax Adult Use of Marijuana Act (AUMA), on June 27, 2017, Governor Brown signed into law Senate Bill (SB) 94 (MAUCRSA), which immediately created a single State regulatory system for medicinal and nonmedicinal commercial cannabis businesses.

At its December 13, 2017 meeting, the Planning Commission unanimously approved Resolution No. PC 17:033, recommending approval of this ZOTA request. The Planning Commission requested that staff clarify ambiguities in the draft ordinance language regarding the personal possession of marijuana or marijuana products in compliance with Proposition 64 and MAUCRSA. The ordinance for City Council review satisfies the Planning Commission's request for clarification by deferring more directly to the California Health and Safety Code in terms of personal cannabis possession.

Background

State of California and City of Paramount milestones that occurred prior to the approval of Proposition 64 and corresponding legislative actions in relation to marijuana are summarized below.

In 1996, State of California voters approved Proposition 215 (entitled "The Compassionate Use Act of 1996" or "CUA" and codified as California Health and Safety Code § 11362.5) to enable persons in need of marijuana for medical purposes to use it without fear of criminal prosecution under limited, specified circumstances.

In 2004, the State Legislature enacted SB 420 (the "Medical Marijuana Program" and codified as California Health & Safety Code § 11362.7 et seq.) to clarify the scope of Proposition 215 and to provide qualifying patients and primary caregivers who collectively or cooperatively cultivate marijuana for medical purposes with a limited defense to certain specified State criminal statutes. Assembly Bill (AB) 2650 of 2010 and AB 1300 of 2011 amended the Medical Marijuana Program to expressly recognize the authority of counties and cities to "[a]dopt local ordinances that regulate the location, operation, or establishment of a medical marijuana cooperative or collective" and to civilly and criminally enforce such ordinances.

On June 5, 2012, the City Council adopted Urgency Ordinance No. 1037, which added Chapter 11G ("Medical Marijuana Dispensaries") to the Municipal Code following moratoria established by Urgency Ordinance No. 1020 on August 3, 2010 and Ordinance No. 1021 on September 7, 2010. Urgency Ordinance No. 1037 prohibited medical marijuana dispensaries from establishing and operating within the City of Paramount, but did not explicitly ban the cultivation of marijuana.

On October 9, 2015, Governor Brown signed into law three bills (AB 266, AB 243, and SB 643), collectively known as the Medical Marijuana Regulation and Safety Act ("MMRSA"), effective January 1, 2016. The MMRSA set up a State-licensing scheme for commercial medical marijuana uses while protecting local control by requiring that all such businesses must have a local license or permit to operate in addition to a State license. The MMRSA allowed cities to completely prohibit commercial medical marijuana activities, including dispensaries, mobile dispensaries, and cultivation.

On March 1, 2016, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 1065, which amended Chapter 11G of the Municipal Code (renaming the chapter "Medical Marijuana and Cultivation") to prohibit all commercial medical marijuana uses in Paramount, including mobile dispensaries, and prohibited cultivation for medical use.

Summary – General

The Medicinal and Adult-Use Cannabis Regulation and Safety Act (MAUCRSA), signed into law on June 27, 2017 as noted above, repealed the Medical Marijuana Regulation and Safety Act (MMRSA) and incorporated certain provisions from the MMRSA into the licensing provisions of Proposition 64 to create a consolidated act.

The MAUCRSA allows local governments to continue prohibiting or regulating commercial operations, activities, and uses relating to cannabis, including but not limited to adopting and enforcing zoning and land use requirements and other local regulations prohibiting medicinal and nonmedicinal cannabis businesses. Such businesses include the cultivation, possession, manufacture, distribution, processing, storing, laboratory testing, packaging, labeling, transportation, delivery, and retail sale of cannabis and cannabis products; enacting and enforcing reasonable regulations relating to the personal cultivation of cannabis indoors, and prohibiting the personal cultivation of cannabis outdoors; and prohibiting the possession, smoking, and ingestion of cannabis and cannabis products in public places, places where smoking is currently prohibited and otherwise, and within buildings owned, leased or occupied by a State or local government agency, among other places.

The City has the option to readopt permanent, express regulations prohibiting commercial cannabis operations. Such uses include all medicinal and nonmedicinal commercial cannabis activities such as the operation of dispensaries, cooperatives, collectives, microbusinesses, or similar establishments where medicinal or nonmedicinal cannabis and/or medicinal or nonmedicinal cannabis products are sold. Others include the commercial cultivation, possession, manufacture, distribution, processing, storing, laboratory testing, packaging, labeling, transportation, delivery; or retail, wholesale, or other form of sale of medicinal or nonmedicinal cannabis and/or medicinal or nonmedicinal cannabis and/or medicinal or nonmedicinal cannabis products, and any and all associated business and/or operational activities and uses. Outdoor cultivation of cannabis for residential and commercial purposes can also be prohibited, and the City can prohibit the indoor cultivation of cannabis in excess of what is permitted under the MAUCRSA and regulate permissible indoor cultivation of cannabis.

Readopting permanent, express regulations prohibiting commercial cannabis operations, activities, and uses following the approval of the AUMA and adoption of the MAUCRSA is recommended for the continued protection and preservation of the public health, safety, and welfare of the community, and to prevent adverse impacts that such cannabis operations, activities, and uses may have on nearby properties and residents.

Summary – Residential Indoor Cultivation

Proposition 64/AUMA allows adults 21 years of age and older to plant, cultivate, or process up to six marijuana plants for personal use within a private residence. As noted in the general summary above, the proposed ordinance includes the prohibition of outdoor cultivation of marijuana for residential and commercial purposes. The City must permit the limited personal cultivation of cannabis indoors in compliance with State law but may impose certain regulations on indoor cultivation. Paramount does not currently regulate the personal cultivation of cannabis indoors. The proposed ordinance includes the following indoor cultivation regulations for private residences:

- Cultivation is prohibited in common areas such as living rooms, hallways, kitchen, and bathrooms
- Cultivation areas shall be properly ventilated so as to not create a humidity or mold problem
- A residence must remain at all times a residential use with legal and functioning cooking, sleeping, and sanitation facilities
- Cultivation shall not displace required off-street parking
- An administrative permit for cultivation shall be obtained from the Community Development Department

Future Reassessment

It should be noted that the prohibition of commercial marijuana activities may be revisited as time passes and the overall state and federal regulatory climate and institutional finance sector become more amenable. If the City Council decides to reconsider the prohibition of commercial marijuana activities, restricted commercial uses would likely include taxation of such activities so as to fund City services necessitated by such activity. This measured approach will allow for the State of California licensing and regulation mechanism to begin on January 1, 2018 and for Paramount to learn from the best practices of other jurisdictions. Should the City eventually allow commercial marijuana activities following extensive public discourse and establishment of an extensive local regulatory structure, its current legislative intent is that it will impose criteria for eligibility for approval to engage in limited commercial marijuana activity.

Environmental Review

The Planning Commission considered the proposed ZOTA in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). The adoption of the ordinance is exempt from CEQA pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15305, minor alterations in land use limitations in areas with an average slope of less than 20% that do not result in any changes in land use or density and Section 15061(b)(3) which is the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment, and CEQA does not apply where it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity may have a significant effect on the environment.

Recommended Action

It is recommended that the City Council read by title only, waive further reading, introduce Ordinance No. 1098, and place it on the next regular agenda for adoption.

ORDINANCE NO. 1098

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PARAMOUNT, CALIFORNIA, APPROVING ZONING ORDINANCE TEXT AMENDMENT NO. 9. AMENDING IN FULL CHAPTER 11G (CANNABIS [MARIJUANA]) OF THE PARAMOUNT MUNICIPAL CODE, AMENDING SECTIONS 44-1 AND 44-2 OF CHAPTER 44 OF THE PARAMOUNT MUNICIPAL CODE, AND ADDING CHAPTER 44, ARTICLE XXVII CULTIVATION, INDOOR) OF THE (CANNABIS PARAMOUNT MUNICIPAL CODE TO ADDRESS MARIJUANA (CANNABIS) OPERATIONS, USES, AND ACTIVITIES IN THE CITY OF PARAMOUNT

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PARAMOUNT DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. <u>Findings and Purpose</u>. The City Council finds and declares as follows:

WHEREAS, The Federal Controlled Substances Act, 21 U.S.C. § 801 et seq., (CSA) classifies marijuana as a Schedule 1 Drug, which is defined as a drug or other substance that has a high potential for abuse, that has no currently accepted medical use in treatment in the United States, and that has not been accepted as safe for use under medical supervision. The Federal Controlled Substances Act makes it unlawful under Federal law for any person to cultivate, manufacture, distribute, or dispense marijuana; or possess with intent to manufacture, distribute, or dispense marijuana. The Federal Controlled Substances Act contains no exemption for medical purposes, although there is recent case law that raises a question as to whether the Federal Government may enforce the Act where medical marijuana is allowed; and

WHEREAS, in 1996, California voters approved Proposition 215, entitled the Compassionate Use Act (CUA) (California Health and Safety (H&S) Code sections 11362.5, et seq.), to ensure that seriously ill individuals have the right to obtain and use marijuana for medical purposes when recommended by a physician. The CUA also exempts patients and their primary caregivers from criminal prosecution or sanctions under State law; and

WHEREAS, in 2004, the Legislature enacted Senate Bill 420 (codified as California Health and Safety Code § 11362.7 et seq. and referred to as the "Medical Marijuana Program" or "MMP") to clarify the scope of Proposition 215 and to provide qualifying patients and primary caregivers who collectively or cooperatively cultivate marijuana for medical purposes with a limited defense to certain specified State criminal statutes. Assembly Bill 2650 (2010) and Assembly Bill 1300 (2011) amended the Medical Marijuana Program to expressly recognize the authority of counties and cities to adopt "local ordinances that regulate the location, operation, or establishment of a medical marijuana cooperative or collective" and to civilly and criminally enforce such ordinances; and

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court has continuously found that marijuana, including medical marijuana, violates Federal law under the CSA. In 2001, the Court held in *United States v. Oakland Cannabis Buyers Cooperative, et al.* that there was no "medical necessity" defense under the CSA, and therefore a medical marijuana dispensary could be enjoined from distribution and manufacturing. In 2005, the Court held in *Gonzalez v. Raich* that the Commerce Clause authorizes Congress to prohibit the cultivation or use of marijuana for medical purposes permitted by California law. The significance of the *Raich* decision is that Federal law enforcement agents may decide to continue to enforce Federal drug laws against Californians who cultivate, use, or dispense marijuana; and

WHEREAS, in <u>City of Riverside v. Inland Empire Patients Health and Wellness</u> <u>Center, Inc.</u> (2013) 56 Cal.4th 729, the California Supreme Court held that "[n]othing in the CUA or the MMP expressly or impliedly limits the inherent authority of a local jurisdiction, by its own ordinances, to regulate the use of its land. . ." Additionally, in <u>Maral v. City of Live Oak</u> (2013) 221 Cal.App.4th 975, the Court of Appeal held that "there is no right – and certainly no constitutional right – to cultivate medical marijuana". The Court in <u>Maral</u> affirmed the ability of a local governmental entity to prohibit the cultivation of marijuana under its land use authority; and

WHEREAS, on October 9, 2015, Governor Brown signed into law three bills (AB 266, AB 243, and SB 643) which collectively are known as the Medical Marijuana Regulation and Safety Act (hereafter "MMRSA"). The MMRSA set up a State licensing scheme for commercial medical marijuana uses while protecting local control by requiring that all such businesses must have a local license or permit to operate in addition to a State license. The MMRSA allows the City to completely prohibit commercial medical marijuana activities; and

WHEREAS, on February 16, 2016, the City Council adopted Ordinance No. 1065 which amended Paramount Municipal Code Chapter 11G and Chapter 44 of the Paramount Municipal Code (Zoning Ordinance) respectively to expressly prohibit the following:

- 1. Commercial cannabis activities of all types in all zones and all specific plans in the City of Paramount;
- 2. Prohibiting any person establishing, operating, conducting, or allowing a commercial cannabis activity anywhere in the City of Paramount, including commercial delivery of cannabis within the City from a fixed location, from a Mobile Dispensary;
- 3. Prohibiting the cultivation, and any effort to locate, operate, own, lease, supply allow to be operated, or aid, abet, or assist in the operation of a commercial cannabis activity;
- 4. Prohibiting all deliveries of medical cannabis within the City of Paramount, including deliveries that either originate or terminate within the City;
- 5. Prohibiting all cannabis activities for which a State license is required;
- 6. Prohibiting cultivation of cannabis for non-commercial purposes, including cultivation by a qualified patient or a primary caregiver prohibited in all zones and all specific plan areas in the City of Paramount; and

WHEREAS, on November 8, 2016, California voters approved Proposition 64, also known as the Control, Regulate and Tax Adult Use of Marijuana Act (AUMA). The AUMA, which took effect on November 9, 2016, allows persons 21 years of age and older to (a) smoke, ingest or otherwise use nonmedicinal marijuana and marijuana products; (b) purchase, possess, transport, obtain, or give away without compensation to persons age 21 and older up to 28.5 grams of marijuana or eight grams of concentrated marijuana; and (c) plant, cultivate, or process up to six living marijuana plants for personal use; and

WHEREAS, on June 27, 2017, the Governor of California signed into law Senate Bill 94, a budget trailer bill known as the Medicinal and Adult-Use Cannabis Regulation and Safety Act (MAUCRSA), which took effect immediately to create a single State regulatory system for medicinal and nonmedicinal commercial cannabis businesses. The MAUCRSA repealed the MMRSA adopted in 2015 and incorporated certain provisions from the MMRSA into the licensing provisions of the AUMA to create one consolidated act known as the MAUCRSA; and

WHEREAS, the MAUCRSA allows local governments to continue prohibiting or regulating commercial operations, activities, and uses relating to cannabis, including, but not limited to, adopting and enforcing zoning and land use requirements and other local regulations prohibiting medicinal and nonmedicinal cannabis businesses, including the cultivation, possession, manufacture, distribution, processing, storing, laboratory testing, packaging, labeling, transportation, delivery, and retail sale of cannabis and cannabis products; enacting and enforcing reasonable regulations relating to the personal cultivation of cannabis indoors, and prohibiting the personal cultivation of cannabis outdoors; and prohibiting the possession, smoking, and ingestion of cannabis and cannabis products in public places, places where smoking is prohibited under the Paramount Municipal Code and otherwise, and within buildings owned, leased, or occupied by a State or local government agency, among other places; and

WHEREAS, local agencies that have permitted medicinal or nonmedicinal cannabis dispensaries to operate in their jurisdictions, in California, and nationally have reported experiencing an overconcentration of such land uses; armed burglaries, robberies and thefts occurring at the dispensaries; an increase in other criminal activity in the vicinity of these dispensaries; persons under 21 years of age, drug addicts, and documented gang members loitering at and around the dispensaries; dispensary customers using cannabis and then driving under the influence of cannabis; dispensaries selling illegal drugs other than cannabis; dispensaries selling cannabis and cannabis products to persons under 21 years of age; loss of trade for commercial businesses located near dispensaries; excessive energy use; and faulty and dangerous electrical and plumbing problems at the dispensaries; and

WHEREAS, several jurisdictions throughout the State in the absence of a complete licensing framework have reported adverse effects and nuisance impacts relating to cannabis cultivation, including, but not limited to, the strong and potentially noxious odors associated with mature cannabis plants; impacts to the environment, including spraying of chemicals and toxins (i.e. fertilizers, pesticides, herbicides, rodenticides, and insecticides) at grow sites and the potential for storm water runoff

and groundwater impacts, greenhouse gas emissions, excessive energy use, generator use producing localized noise, irresponsible and significant water use (the California Department of Fish and Wildlife reported that researchers estimate each plant of cannabis consumes six gallons of water each day, which is problematic because California public agencies stress the importance of continued water conservation measures given the recent drought, the lingering effects of the drought, and the potential for future droughts), and dangerous fire hazards; problems associated with mold, fungus, and pests; abandonment of trash and waste once plants are harvested; proximity of children to areas under cultivation; visibility of grows from the public right-of-way; and an increase in crime, including robberies, theft, and trespassing; and

WHEREAS, while the City currently prohibits all commercial cannabis activities, including commercial and non-commercial cultivation and medical cannabis, whether fixed or mobile, and in all zones as a land use under the City of Paramount Zoning Ordinance under Ordinance No. 1065 as well as prohibiting all such activities for which a State license is required under both the AUMA and MAUCRSA, following the approval of the AUMA and the MAUCRSA, the City must permit the limited personal cultivation of cannabis indoors in compliance with State law but may impose certain regulations on such indoor cultivation as permitted under State law. The City does not currently regulate the personal cultivation of cannabis indoors; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to re-adopt permanent, express regulations prohibiting commercial cannabis operations, uses, and activities, including, but not limited to, all medicinal and nonmedicinal commercial cannabis activities, such as the operation of dispensaries, cooperatives, collectives, microbusinesses, or similar establishments where medicinal or nonmedicinal cannabis and/or medicinal or nonmedicinal cannabis products are sold, and the commercial cultivation, possession manufacture, distribution, processing, storing, laboratory testing, packaging, labeling, transportation, delivery, or retail, wholesale, or other form of sale of medicinal or nonmedicinal cannabis and/or medicinal or nonmedicinal cannabis products, and any and all associated business and/or operational activities and uses, as well as the outdoor cultivation of cannabis and the indoor cultivation of cannabis in excess of what is permitted under the MAUCRSA. Re-adopting permanent, express regulations prohibiting commercial cannabis operations, activities, and uses following the approval of the AUMA and adoption of the MAUCRSA is recommended for the continued protection and preservation of the public health, safety, and welfare of the community and to prevent adverse impacts that such cannabis operations, activities, and uses may have on nearby properties and residents; and

WHEREAS, the prohibition of commercial marijuana activities may be revisited in the future and would likely include taxation of such activities so as to fund City services generated by such activity; and

WHEREAS, this measured approach will allow for the State of California licensing and regulation mechanism to begin on January 1, 2018 and for the City to learn from the best practices of other jurisdictions; and

WHEREAS, should the City eventually allow commercial marijuana activities following extensive public discourse and establishment of an extensive regulatory structure, its current legislative intent is that it will impose criteria for eligibility for approval to engage in limited commercial marijuana activity; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission held a duly noticed public hearing on December 13, 2017 at which time it considered all evidence presented, both written and oral and at the end of the hearing voted to adopt Resolution No. PC 17:033, recommending that the City Council adopt this Ordinance; and

WHEREAS, the City Council held a duly noticed public hearing on this Ordinance on January 9, 2018 at which time it considered all evidence presented, both written and oral.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.

<u>SECTION 3</u>. <u>Authority</u>. This ordinance is adopted pursuant to the authority granted by the California Constitution and State law, including, but not limited to, Article XI, Section 7 of the California Constitution, the Compassionate Use Act, the Medical Marijuana Program, the Medical Marijuana Regulation and Safety Act, and the Medicinal and Adult-Use Cannabis Regulation and Safety Act.

<u>SECTION 4</u>. Chapter 11G of the Paramount Municipal Code is hereby amended in full to read as follows:

Sec. 11G-1. Definitions.

For purposes of this chapter, the following terms and phrases shall have the meaning as defined in this section. Whenever any word or phrase used in this chapter is not defined herein, but is defined under state law, the definition set forth in state law is incorporated into this chapter as though fully set forth herein.

<u>Cannabis (or marijuana)</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term "cannabis" shall also include all parts of the plant *Cannabis sativa Linnaeus, Cannabis indica*, or *Cannabis ruderalis*, whether growing or not; the seeds of the plant; the resin, whether crude or purified, extracted from any part of the plant; and every compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the plant, its seeds, or resin. "Cannabis" shall also include the separated resin, whether crude or purified, obtained from cannabis. Whenever the term "cannabis" is used throughout this code, the term may include medicinal cannabis and/or nonmedicinal cannabis. "Cannabis" shall not include either of the following:

(a) "Industrial hemp" as defined by California Health and Safety Code Section 11018.5.

(b) The weight of any other ingredient combined with Cannabis to prepare topical or oral administrations, food, drink, or other product as defined under California Health and Safety Code Section 11018.

<u>Cannabis accessories</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term "cannabis accessories" shall also include any equipment, products, or materials of any kind which are used, intended for use, or designed for use in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, Processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, smoking, using, vaporizing, or containing cannabis for ingesting, inhaling, or otherwise introducing cannabis or cannabis products into the human body.

<u>Cannabis products</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term "cannabis products" shall also include cannabis that has undergone a process whereby the plant material has been transformed into a concentrate, including, but not limited to, concentrated cannabis, or an edible or topical product containing cannabis or concentrated cannabis and other ingredients as defined under California Health and Safety Code Section 11018.1, as that section may be amended from time to time. Whenever the term "cannabis products" is used throughout this code, the term may include medicinal cannabis products and/or nonmedicinal cannabis products.

<u>City</u> shall mean the City of Paramount.

<u>Commercial cannabis activity</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term "commercial cannabis activity" shall also include the cultivation, possession, manufacture, distribution, processing, storing, laboratory testing, packaging, labeling, transportation, delivery or sale of cannabis and cannabis products. Commercial cannabis activity includes operations, activities and uses that are for profit and/or not for profit.

<u>Cultivation</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term "cultivation" shall also include the planting, growing, harvesting, drying, cleaning, curing, grading, trimming, packing, storing, handling, or processing of cannabis, cannabis products, and/or the byproducts of the cannabis products, and any and all associated business and/or operational activities and uses. <u>Delivery</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term "delivery" shall also include the commercial delivery, transfer, or transport of cannabis or cannabis products by a state-licensed retailer of any technology platform to arrange for the commercial delivery, transfer, or transport of cannabis or cannabis products, to or from any location within the jurisdictional limits of the City of Paramount and any and all associated business and/or operational activities and uses. "Delivery" shall not include the transportation of cannabis or cannabis products on public roads by a state-licensed retailer, microbusiness, or nonprofit licensed under California Business and Professions Code Section 26070.5 when transporting cannabis or cannabis products in compliance with state law and when the delivery originates from and terminates in a location outside the City.

Dispensary means any facility or location, whether fixed or mobile, where cannabis and/or cannabis products are sold, distributed, or made available. For purposes of this chapter, the terms "clinic", "cooperative", "collective", "cannabis establishment", "microbusiness" or any other establishments where cannabis and/or cannabis products are sold shall have the same meaning as the term "dispensary" defined by this section. A dispensary shall not include the following uses, as long as the location of such uses is otherwise regulated by this code or applicable law, a clinic licensed pursuant to Chapter 1 of Division 2 of the California Health and Safety Code, a healthcare facility licensed pursuant to Chapter 2 of Division 2 of the California Health and Safety Code, a facility licensed pursuant to Chapter 2 of Division 2 of the California Health and Safety Code, a residential care facility for persons with chronic life-threatening illnesses licensed pursuant to Chapter 3.01 of Division 2 of the California Health and Safety Code, a residential care facility for the elderly licensed pursuant to Chapter 3.2 of Division 2 of the California Health and Safety Code, a residential hospice, or a home health agency licensed pursuant to Chapter 8 of Division 2 of the California Health and Safety Code, as long as such use complies strictly with applicable law, including, but not limited to, California Health and Safety Code Section 11362.5 et seq., and the Paramount Municipal Code, including, but not limited to, the provisions of the Zoning Ordinance.

Indoor shall mean a private residence located within a fully enclosed and secure structure.

<u>Laboratory testing (or testing laboratory)</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term "laboratory testing" shall also include a laboratory facility or entity in the state that offers or performs tests of cannabis and/or cannabis products and that is both of the following: (1) accredited by an accrediting body that is independent from all other persons involved in commercial cannabis activity in the state; and (2) licensed by the State Bureau of Cannabis Control within the Department of Consumer Affairs. <u>Manufacture</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term "manufacture" shall also include the compounding, blending, extracting, infusing, or otherwise making or preparation of cannabis products and any and all associated business and/or operational activities and uses.

<u>Medicinal cannabis (or medicinal cannabis products)</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term "medicinal cannabis" or "medicinal cannabis products" shall also include cannabis or cannabis products, respectively, intended to be sold for medical use to a medicinal cannabis patient with a valid physician's recommendation and/or a medicinal cannabis patient's primary caregiver, as that term is defined in the Compassionate Use Act of 1996 (California Health and Safety Code Section 11362.5 et seq.).

<u>Nonmedicinal cannabis (or nonmedicinal cannabis products)</u> shall mean cannabis or cannabis products, respectively, intended to be sold for nonmedicinal use by an adult, 21 years of age or older pursuant to state law.

Outdoor shall mean any location that is not within a fully enclosed and secure structure.

<u>Person or entity</u> shall mean an individual, association, partnership, joint venture, corporation, or any other type of organization, whether conducted for profit or not for profit, or a director, executive, officer, or manager of an association, partnership, joint venture, corporation, or other organization.

<u>Public place</u> shall mean any area to which the public is invited or in which the public is permitted, including, but not limited to, retail stores, retail service establishments, retail food production and marketing establishments, restaurants, theaters, waiting rooms, reception areas, educational facilities, and public transportation facilities. Public place shall include all buildings owned, leased, or occupied by the City and all City facilities. Public place shall also include all buildings owned, leased, or occupied by the City and all City and all City facilities, grounds, trails, and/or parks and recreational areas, whether or not enclosed. A private residence is not a public place.

<u>Private residence</u> shall mean a house, apartment unit, mobile home, or other similar dwelling. An accessory dwelling unit does not constitute a "private residence".

<u>Processing</u> means any method used to prepare cannabis, cannabis products, and/or the byproducts of the cannabis products for commercial retail and/or wholesale sales, including, but not limited to, cleaning, curing, preparation, laboratory testing, manufacturing, packaging, and extraction of active ingredients to create cannabis products and concentrates.

<u>Transportation</u> shall mean to transport for sale. "Transportation" shall not include the transportation of cannabis or cannabis products on public roads by a state-licensed retailer, microbusiness, or nonprofit licensed under California Business and Professions Code Section 26070.5 when transporting cannabis or cannabis products in compliance with state law and when the transportation originates from and terminates in a location outside the City.

<u>Volatile solvent</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Health and Safety Code Section 11362.3, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term "volatile solvent" shall also include a solvent that produces a flammable or non-flammable gas or vapor that, when present in the air in sufficient quantities, will create explosive or ignitable mixtures, and volatile organic compounds, including (1) explosive gases, such as butane, propane, xylene, styrene gasoline, kerosene, carbon dioxide (CO2), or hydrogen (H2); and (2) dangerous poisons, toxins, or carcinogens, such as methanol, iso-propyl, alcohol, methylene chloride, acetone, benzene, toluene, and tri-chloro-ethylene.

Sec. 11G-2. Purpose and intent.

It is the intent of this chapter to protect and preserve the public health, safety, and welfare of the City and its residents and businesses. Possession, sale, and distribution of medicinal and nonmedicinal cannabis remain prohibited by federal law under the Controlled Substances Act. The purpose of this chapter is to expressly prohibit commercial cannabis activities, cannabis deliveries and the outdoor cultivation of cannabis from occurring in any zone within the jurisdictional limits of the City of Paramount to the fullest extent authorized by State law, as well as to prohibit the use and possession of cannabis and cannabis products in public places, and to reasonably regulate the personal, indoor cultivation of cannabis consistent with state law, among other operations, uses, and activities is within the authority conferred upon City by state law and is an exercise of the City council's police powers to enact and enforce regulations for the public benefit, safety, and welfare of the City.

Sec. 11G-3. Prohibited cannabis operations, uses, and/or activities.

- (a) <u>Cannabis operations, uses, and/or activities requiring a state license</u>. Any cannabis operation, use, and/or activity for which a state license is required under California Business and Professions Code Section 26050, as that section may be amended from time to time, is prohibited in all zones within the City's jurisdictional limits. No permit, license, or other entitlement or authorization, whether conditional or otherwise, shall be issued for the establishment of any such operation, use, and/or activity.
- (b) <u>Commercial cannabis activity</u>. Pursuant to authority granted under California Business and Professions Code Section 26200, as that section may be amended from time to time, commercial cannabis activity, defined in Section 11G-2, and any and all associated business and/or operational activities and uses, is/are prohibited in all zones within the City's jurisdictional limits. No person shall establish, operate, maintain, conduct, or allow any commercial cannabis activity

anywhere within the City. No permit, license, or other entitlement or authorization, whether conditional or otherwise, shall be issued for the establishment of such use.

- (c) <u>Property owners</u>. A property owner shall not rent, lease, or otherwise permit any business that engages in any commercial cannabis activity to occupy real property and/or any improvements thereon in the City. A property owner shall not allow any person or business to establish, operate, maintain, conduct, or engage in commercial cannabis activity on any real property owned or controlled by that property owner within the City.
- (d) <u>Deliveries</u>. To the extent not already prohibited by subdivision (b) of this section, cannabis delivery, as defined in Section 11G-2 by any person or entity including, but not limited to, dispensaries, and any and all associated business and/or operational activities and uses, is prohibited in all zones within the City's jurisdictional limits. No permit, license, or other entitlement or authorization, whether conditional or otherwise, shall be issued for the establishment of such operation, use, and/or activity. Nothing in this chapter is intended to, nor shall it be construed to, make legal any delivery operation, use, and/or activity that is otherwise prohibited under California law.
- (e) <u>Transportation</u>. To the extent not already prohibited by subdivision (b) of this section, cannabis transportation, as defined in Section 11G-2, by any person or entity, including, but not limited to, dispensaries and any and all associated business and/or operational activities and uses, is prohibited in all zones within the City's jurisdictional limits. No permit, license, or other entitlement or authorization, whether conditional or otherwise, shall be issued for the establishment of such operation, use, and/or activity. Nothing in the chapter is intended to, nor shall it be construed to, make legal any transportation operation, use, and/or activity that is otherwise prohibited under California law.
- (f) <u>Outdoor cultivation</u>. Outdoor cultivation by any person or entity, including, but not limited to, dispensaries and any and all associated business and/or operational activities and uses, is prohibited in all zones within the City's jurisdictional limits. No permit, license, variance, or other entitlement or authorization, whether conditional or otherwise, shall be issued for the establishment of such operation, use, and/or activity. Nothing in this chapter is intended to, nor shall it be construed to, make legal any outdoor cultivation operation, use, and/or activity that is otherwise prohibited under California law. Nothing in this chapter is intended to, nor shall it be construed to, preclude any landlord from limiting or prohibiting outdoor cultivation by its tenants.
- (g) <u>Indoor cultivation</u>. The prohibition under subsection (b) of this section shall not prohibit the indoor cultivation of six (6) or fewer living cannabis plants, which shall be permitted only within a single private residence; to the extent such cultivation is permitted by state law and complies with the requirements set forth in Chapter 44, Article XXVII. <u>Cannabis cultivation, indoor</u> of this code.

- (h) Use and possession of cannabis and cannabis products in public places. No person shall smoke, ingest, inhale, vaporize, or otherwise use or introduce cannabis or cannabis products into the human body, or possess an open container or open package of cannabis or cannabis products, in, on, or within any public place as defined by Section 11G-2 of this chapter or in violation of any state or federal law, including, but not limited to California Health and Safety Code Section 11357, et seq. and as amended from time to time.
- (i) <u>Sale of cannabis accessories</u>. No person or entity shall sell or permit to be sold any cannabis accessories, or violate any other local, state, or federal law regulating drug paraphernalia, including, but not limited to, California Health and Safety Code Section 11362.3, as that section may be amended from time to time.

Sec. 11G-4. Permissive zoning.

Nothing in this chapter shall be interpreted to the effect that the City's permissive zoning regulations, which prohibit any use unless expressly permitted and which are located in Chapter 44 of the municipal code, allows any other use not specifically listed therein.

Sec. 11G-5. Public nuisance.

Any operation, use, and/or activity that takes place in violation of any provision of this chapter or Chapter 44, Article XXVII is unlawful, and is hereby declared to be a public nuisance subject to abatement by the City. Each and every day a violation of any provision of this chapter exists constitutes a separate and distinct violation.

Sec. 11G-6. Violations and penalties - enforcement.

- (a) Any person who knowingly or willfully violates any provision of this chapter shall be guilty of a misdemeanor or infraction in the discretion of the city attorney and punishable in accordance with Section 1-16 of this code.
- (b) The remedies and penalties provided herein are cumulative, alternative and nonexclusive. The use of one does not prevent the use of any other criminal, civil, or administrative remedy or penalty authorized by, or set forth in, the Paramount Municipal Code. None of the penalties or remedies authorized by, or set forth in, the Paramount Municipal Code shall prevent the City from using any other penalty or remedy under state statute which may be available to enforce this Chapter or to abate a public nuisance. The City is entitled to recover attorney's fees and any and all costs of suit, including, but not limited to, witness fees, in any such civil action.

<u>SECTION 5</u>. Chapter 44, Sections 44-1 and 44-2 of the Paramount Municipal Code are hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 44-1. Definitions.

<u>"Cannabis" or "marijuana"</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term "cannabis" shall also include all parts of the plant *Cannabis sativa Linnaeus*, *Cannabis indica*, or *Cannabis ruderalis*, whether growing or not; the seeds of the plant; the resin, whether crude or purified, extracted from any part of the plant; and every compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the plant, its seeds, or resin. "Cannabis" shall also include the separated resin, whether crude or purified, obtained from cannabis. Whenever the term "Cannabis" is used throughout this code, the term may include medicinal cannabis and/or nonmedicinal cannabis. "Cannabis" shall not include either of the following:

- (a) "Industrial hemp" as defined by California Health and Safety Code Section 11018.5.
- (b) The weight of any other ingredient combined with Cannabis to prepare topical or oral administrations, food, drink, or other product.

<u>Cannabis cultivation, indoor (land use)</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term cannabis cultivation, indoor (land use) shall also include the planting, growing, harvesting, drying, cleaning, curing, grading, trimming, packing, storing, or handling of cannabis, cannabis products, and/or the byproducts of the cannabis products, and any and all associated business and/or operational uses and activities that occur to the extent permitted by state law and in compliance with Chapter 44, Article XXVII of this Zoning Ordinance.

<u>Cannabis cultivation, outdoor (land use)</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term cannabis cultivation, outdoor (land use) shall also include the planting, growing, harvesting, drying, cleaning, curing, grading, trimming, packing, storing, or handling of cannabis, cannabis products, and/or the byproducts of the cannabis products, and any and all associated business and/or operational uses and activities that occur at any location that are not within a fully enclosed and secure structure. Cannabis cultivation, outdoor is a prohibited use under Section 44-2 of this Zoning Ordinance.

<u>Cannabis products</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term "cannabis products" shall also include cannabis that has undergone a process whereby the plant material has been transformed into a concentrate, including, but not limited to, concentrated cannabis, or an edible or topical product containing cannabis or concentrated cannabis and other ingredients. Whenever the term "cannabis products" is used throughout this code, the term may include medicinal cannabis products and/or nonmedicinal cannabis products. <u>Commercial cannabis activity (land use)</u> shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, as that section may be amended from time to time. Notwithstanding any provisions of California Business and Professions Code Section 26001, the term "commercial cannabis activity (land use)" shall also include the operation of a dispensary and the commercial cultivation, possession, manufacture, distribution, processing, storing, laboratory testing, packaging, labeling, transportation, delivery, or retail, wholesale, or other sale of cannabis and/or cannabis products, as those terms are defined under Chapter 11G-2 of this code, and any and all associated business and/or operational uses and activities. Commercial cannabis activity includes operations, activities, and uses that are for profit and/or not for profit.

<u>Fully enclosed and secure structure</u> shall mean a fully-enclosed space within a building that complies with the California Building Code ("CBC"), as adopted by reference by the City (Chapter 10, Article I of the Paramount Municipal Code), or if exempt from the permit requirements of the CBC, that has a complete roof, a foundation, slab, or equivalent base to which the floor is secured by bolts or similar attachments, is secure against unauthorized entry, is accessible only through one or more lockable doors, and is not visible from a public right-of-way. Walls and roofs must be constructed of solid materials that cannot be easily broken through such as two inch by four inch nominal or thicker studs overlaid with three-eighths inch or thicker plywood or the equivalent. Plastic sheeting, regardless of gauge, or similar products do not satisfy this requirement. If indoor grow lights or air filtration systems are used, they must comply with the California building, electrical, and fire codes as adopted in the City.

<u>Person or entity</u> shall mean an individual, association, partnership, joint venture, corporation, or any other type of organization, whether conducted for profit or not for profit, or a director, executive, officer, or manager of an association, partnership, joint venture, corporation, or other organization.

Sec. 44-2. Purposes of chapter.

The purpose of this chapter is to classify uses and to regulate the location of such uses in such a manner as to group, as nearly as possible, those which are mutually compatible and to protect each such group of uses from the intrusion of incompatible uses which would destroy the security and stability of land and improvements and which would also prevent maximum convenience and service to the citizens of Paramount; to make it possible for the City to strategically locate public buildings; to make it possible for the City to efficiently and economically design, install, and operate, in terms of location, size, and capacity, public service facilities such as streets, drains, and sewers, in order to adequately and permanently meet the ultimate requirements as determined by a defined intensity and type of land use; to require an orderly arrangement of essential related facilities with particular reference to the traffic pattern and well-located and well-designed off-street parking areas, and through the medium of the zoning map which is a part of this chapter, to establish the geographical location and boundaries of the areas or zones to which the different classifications will apply. A further purpose of this chapter is to establish required minimum lot areas, yards, and open spaces as a means of providing a suitable environment for living, business, and industry, and for the purpose of maintaining reasonable population densities and reasonable intensities of land use, all for the general purpose of conserving public health, safety, morals, convenience, and general welfare.

<u>Unlawful uses</u>. Uses that are unlawful under federal or state law, or under the Paramount Municipal Code, shall not be treated as permitted or conditionally permitted uses in any zones within the City, and shall not be determined to be similar uses pursuant to this code.

<u>SECTION 6</u>. Chapter 44, Article XXVII of the Paramount Municipal Code is hereby added to read to read as follows:

Article XXVII. Cannabis Cultivation, Indoor.

Sec. 44-297. Cannabis cultivation, indoor.

Cannabis cultivation, indoor shall be permitted within a legally permitted single private residence in all zones within the jurisdictional limits of the City of Paramount to the extent such cultivation is permitted by state law and subject to compliance with the following requirements. For purposes of this section, the term "private residence" shall have the same meaning as the definition set forth in Section 11G-2 of this code, as that section may be amended from time to time.

- (a) Cultivation is limited to six (6) or fewer living cannabis plants per private residence.
- (b) Cultivation is permitted only within fully enclosed and secure structures within or upon the grounds of the private residence that are inaccessible to persons under the age of 21. Cultivation areas shall be secured by lock and key or other security device which prevents unauthorized entry and shall not be visible from the public right-of-way. The total area cultivated shall not exceed one-hundred (100) square feet and not exceed ten (10) feet in height, nor shall it come within twelve (12) inches of the ceiling or any cultivation lighting. Cultivation is prohibited in common areas such as living rooms, hallways, kitchen, and bathrooms and shall be permitted only in a contiguous area. Cultivation in a greenhouse on the property of the private residence but not physically part of the home is permitted, so long as it is fully enclosed, secure, not visible from a public right-of-way, and meeting all requirements in this code.
- (c) Cultivation shall be limited to a total of six (6) plants, whether immature or mature, within or upon the grounds of the private residence, regardless of how many persons reside at the private residence.
- (d) Any lighting, plumbing, or electrical components used for cultivation shall comply with all applicable state and local laws, including, but not limited to, those relating to land conversion, current building and fire standards, grading, electricity usage, water usage, riparian habitat protection, storm water and agricultural discharges.

Lighting shall not exceed 1,200 watts in total. The use of butane or carbon dioxide and ozone generators for cultivation is prohibited. The use of volatile solvents, as that term is defined under Section 11G-2 of this code, for cannabis cultivation is prohibited. Any private residence or fully enclosed and secure structure used for cultivation must have proper ventilation (HVAC) installed and operational, meet building and mechanical codes, and shall not create a humidity or mold problem in violation of this code or any other applicable state or local health and safety regulations.

- (e) Cultivation shall not be conducted in a manner that constitutes a public nuisance or would adversely affect the public health, safety, or welfare, or that interferes with the reasonable enjoyment of life and property by creating light, glare, heat, noise, odor, dust, noxious gases, smoke, traffic, vibration, or other impacts or be hazardous due to use of storage of materials, processes, products, or wastes.
- (f) Any private residence where cultivation occurs shall remain at all times a residence with legal and functioning cooking, sleeping, and sanitation facilities with proper ingress and egress. The private residence shall not be used primarily or exclusively for cultivation.
- (g) A cultivation area shall not displace required off-street parking.
- (h) Home occupation permit provisions are inapplicable to cannabis cultivation, indoor activities.
- (i) A portable, fully-charged fire extinguisher that complies with the regulations and standards adopted by the state fire marshal and all applicable laws shall be kept in every room, space, or area where cultivation occurs.
- (j) No cultivation within a private residence is allowed until and unless an administrative permit from the Community Development Department is secured, the applicant agrees to comply with all regulations of Chapter 44, Article XXVII of the Paramount Municipal Code, and the applicant allows Community Development Department staff access to the proposed cultivation area for an inspection. Any person seeking a permit for cultivation under this section shall provide proof of ownership of the private residence, or, if a tenant or occupant of the private residence, written authorization of the property owner. Any person seeking a permit for cultivation under this section shall occupy the private residence. Only one administrative permit shall be granted per private residence.
- (k) No chemical shall be used for marijuana cultivation that contains any substance on the list prepared pursuant to California Health and Safety Code Section 25249.8; provided that any chemical specifically approved by the California Department of Pesticide Regulation for cannabis cultivation, indoor may be used in amounts prescribed by the Department of Pesticide Regulation. No chemical used for marijuana cultivation shall be stored in a manner visible from neighboring residences or to individuals located outside the property line or in the public right-of-way.

<u>SECTION 7</u>. <u>California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)</u>. This ordinance is exempt from CEQA pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15305, minor alterations in land use limitations in areas with an average slope of less than 20% that do not result in any changes in land use or density and Section 15061(b)(3) which is the general rule that CEQA applies only to projects which have the potential for causing a significant effect on the environment and CEQA does not apply where it can be seen with certainty that there is no possibility that the activity may have a significant effect on the environment.

<u>SECTION 8</u>. If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this ordinance and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

<u>SECTION 9</u>. To the extent the provisions of the Paramount Municipal Code as amended by this ordinance are substantially the same as the provisions of that code as they read immediately prior to the adoption of this ordinance, then those provisions shall be construed as continuations of the earlier provisions and not as new enactments.

<u>SECTION 10</u>. This ordinance shall be certified as to its adoption by the City Clerk and shall be published once in the Paramount Journal within 15 days after its adoption together with the names and members of the City Council voting for and against the ordinance.



ORDINANCE NO. 1096

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PARAMOUNT AMENDING SECTIONS 29-1 AND 29-1.1 OF THE PARAMOUNT MUNICIPAL CODE REGARDING INCORPORATION OF THE COUNTY TRAFFIC CODE

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PARAMOUNT DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> Sections 29-1 and 29-1.1 of the Paramount Municipal Code is hereby amended in its entirety as follows:

"Section 29-1. County Traffic Code Adopted.

Title 15 of the Los Angeles County Code, entitled "Vehicles and Traffic," being a code regulating traffic upon public highways, is hereby adopted by reference as the Traffic Code of the City."

"Section 29-1.1. Penalties; continuing violations.

The first and second violation of any provision of this Chapter may be cited as an infraction or punished as a misdemeanor. The third such violation shall be punished as a misdemeanor by a fine not exceeding \$500 or imprisonment for a term not exceeding six (6) months, or by both such fine and imprisonment. Such violations may also be redressed by civil action."

Each day that any violation of the Chapter continues shall constitute a separate offense.

<u>Section 2.</u> <u>Severability.</u> If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause and phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses or phrases be declared unconstitutional.

<u>Section 3.</u> <u>Effective Date.</u> This Ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its adoption, shall be certified as to its adoption by the City Clerk, and shall be published once in the Paramount Journal within 15 days after its adoption together with the names and members of the City Council voting for and against the Ordinance.



THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PARAMOUNT DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>Section 1.</u> Sections 24-1 and 24-6 of the Paramount Municipal Code is hereby amended in its entirety as follows:

"Section 24-1. County Health Code Adopted.

Title 11 of the Los Angeles County Code, entitled "Health and Safety Code," being a code regulating public health and sanitation, is hereby adopted by reference as the Health Code of the City."

"Section 24-6. Penalty.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, violation of any of the provisions of this chapter incorporating the County Health Code and portions of the County Consumer Protection Code is punishable as misdemeanor by a fine of not more than \$500.00 or by imprisonment in the County jail for not more than six (6) months, or both. Each day during any portion of which any violation herein is committed, or continued to be permitted makes such violation a separate chargeable offense."

<u>Section 2.</u> <u>Severability.</u> If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause and phrase thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses or phrases be declared unconstitutional.

We have received a request from Mr. Albert Howard for the installation of a disabled parking zone in front of his home at 16456 Orizaba Avenue. The request is for Mr. Howard who has a valid disabled person license plate. Mr. Howard is requesting that the disabled parking zone be installed in front of his home due to limited accessible parking options in the neighborhood.

Staff has inspected the site and found that neighborhood on-street parking can be limited throughout the day and can cause a need to park some distance away. The applicant's residence does have some off-street parking via a driveway and garage; however, the driveway and the garage are not ADA accessible. The driveway is too short and the slope is too steep for Mr. Howard to safely exit his vehicle with the use of his wheelchair.

Staff also verified that there were no other disabled parking zones on the street. If approved, approximately 15 feet of curb in front of 16456 Orizaba Avenue would be marked for disabled parking only. Mr. Howard has been informed that the designated disabled parking zone, if approved, will be available for anyone that possesses a valid Disabled Person Placard to use.

At their January meeting, the Public Works Commission recommended to the City Council approval of the request for a disabled parking zone. A notice indicating that the City Council would hear this item was sent to all properties on Orizaba Avenue from Jackson Street to Harrison Street.

Recommended Action

It is recommended that the City Council deny or approve a request for the installation of a disabled parking zone in front of 16456 Orizaba Avenue.





We received a request from Mr. Erick Hernandez to install a speed hump on Rancho Clemente Drive between Rancho Cerona Drive and Rancho Vista Street.

The attached petition contains 17 out of the 23 households (for a 77% survey rate, not accounting for vacancies) that would be directly affected by the proposed speed hump. These 23 households are located on Rancho Clemente Drive between Rancho Cerona Drive and Rancho Vista Street. The residents state that they are concerned for the safety of the residents and neighborhood children due to excessive speeds of vehicles traveling on the street.

Given the length of this street, the City Engineer determined that one speed hump could be installed at 15145 Rancho Clemente Drive.

At their January meeting, the Public Works Commission recommended to the City Council approval of the request to install a speed hump. A notice indicating that the City Council would consider installing a speed hump on Rancho Clemente Drive was mailed to each household in the area.

Recommended Action

It is recommended that the City Council deny or approve a request for the installation of a speed hump and all appropriate signage on Rancho Clemente Drive between Rancho Cerona Drive and Rancho Vista Street.





Subject: Twelve-Month Review of City Council Permit for Live Entertainment – Ace Consolidated Enterprises, LLC/Blvd Cocktails - 8410 Alondra Boulevard

Background

This item is a twelve-month review of a City Council Permit for karaoke live entertainment at Ace Consolidated Enterprises, LLC/Blvd Cocktails at 8410 Alondra Boulevard in the C-3 (General Commercial) zone. The business is a bar, located within the multi-tenant Plaza Gamino retail development at the southeast corner of Alondra Boulevard and Indiana Avenue. The bar is licensed by the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control for the sale of beer, wine, and a full line of liquor for onsite consumption. Blvd Cocktails is open for business daily between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 a.m.

At its July 7, 2015 meeting, the City Council approved a request by the applicant to allow hosted and non-hosted karaoke on Fridays and Saturdays from 7:00 p.m. to 1:30 a.m. The karaoke live entertainment was approved with conditions. (Attachment 1) Since then, the City Council has conducted three six-month reviews of the permit, the first on January 5, 2016, the second on July 5, 2016 and the third on January 10, 2017. The City Council received and filed all three reports, which included information that the applicant was cooperative and in compliance with all conditions of approval.

At the review conducted on July 5, 2016, the City Council required a six-month review at the January 3, 2017 meeting. That regular meeting was rescheduled to January 10, 2017. At the review conducted on January 10, 2017, the City Council required a twelve-month review and this evening we are conducting that review.

Law Enforcement Activity

From January 1, 2017 through December 31, 2017, a total of five law enforcement responses and five compliance checks have occurred. The incidents are summarized as follows:


<u>Analysis</u>

The applicant has continued to comply with all thirty-seven conditions of approval of the City Council Live Entertainment Permit, including requirements to maintain a security guard onsite during karaoke hours and an extensive security camera system. The applicant proactively and cooperatively reports incidents to the Sheriff's Department and maintains a strong working relationship with the City of Paramount. During the incident on May 28, 2017, the business owner was not present at the time of the shooting; however, responded to the business shortly after being notified of the incident and allowed immediate access to the security camera system to Sheriff Deputies. A copy of the video was later provided to the Paramount Detective Bureau by the business owner. Additionally, the business owner was advised by Public Safety and Sworn staff to remind his security staff on the procedures of placing a call for service when the need arises. The incident on May 28, 2017 and the incident on January 22, 2017 occurred during the approved live entertainment hours.

Recommended Action

It is recommended that the City Council receive and file the report with the stipulation for a subsequent twelve-month review.

Background

This application is a request for a City Council Permit to allow karaoke at Blvd Cocktails at 8410 Alondra Boulevard in the C-3 (General Commercial) zone. Since June 2014 the applicant has operated in the suite formerly occupied by the Sports Lounge, located within the Plaza Gamino retail development at the southeast corner of Alondra Boulevard and Indiana Avenue. The property includes two multi-tenant buildings, and the bar occupies the easternmost suite in the building at the south of the parking lot. The business is a bar that is licensed by the California Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC) for "Type-48" sales, which allows for the sale of beer, wine, and a full line of liquor for onsite consumption. Blvd Cocktails is currently open for business daily between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 a.m.

Section 11-5 (n) of the Paramount Municipal Code states that a City Council Permit is required for live performances, including karaoke. The City Council may grant or deny a request for a City Council Permit based on the impact that the proposed use will have on the public health, safety, or welfare. The City Council may also impose conditions upon the granting of a City Council Permit to ensure that the use is not in conflict with surrounding land uses.

Request

The applicant is requesting a City Council Permit to allow karaoke on Fridays and Saturdays of each week. The owners initially requested hours from 7:00 p.m. to 2:00 a.m., but they have agreed to reduce the proposed hours to 7:00 p.m. to 1:30 a.m. at the recommendation of the Sheriff's Department and City staff. Karaoke will not be provided on other days of the week. Karaoke offerings will consist of self-service and hosted formats.

The previous tenant, Sports Lounge, featured karaoke on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays between the hours of 8:00 p.m. to 1:30 a.m. Other Paramount bars and restaurants with existing karaoke entertainment as approved by the City Council are summarized in the chart below:

Discussion

As required by the Municipal Code, the Public Safety Department and the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department have reviewed the application and met with the applicant, and they have no objections to the issuance of this permit. During the course of the year while in business, Blvd Cocktails has operated without serious incident. Security cameras have been installed, and recommended conditions will prevent music and singing from disturbing neighboring tenants or property owners. A licensed security guard will be required onsite during the hours of karaoke. Further, loitering in the parking lot will be expressly prohibited, and all doors will be required to remain closed during the hours of operation except for the entering and exiting of customers and employees. A six-month City Council review is recommended as a condition to ensure the long-term compliance of the conditions of approval and safeguard the surrounding businesses and tenants.

Recommended Action

It is recommended that the City Council read by title only and adopt Resolution No. 15:018, approving a City Council Permit for karaoke at Blvd Cocktails at 8410 Alondra Boulevard, subject to the following conditions:

- 1. This City Council Permit shall not be effective for any purposes until the business owners have filed at the office of the Community Development Department their affidavit stating that they acknowledge and accept all conditions of approval for this permit. The affidavit shall be submitted by Friday, July 24, 2015.
- 2. One security guard in possession of a valid security guard registration from the Bureau of Security and Investigative Service shall be onsite during karaoke hours of operation until the business is closed and until all patrons have vacated the premises. The guard shall be plainly identifiable by uniform and shall patrol the parking lot at least twice each hour as needed.
- 3. Self-service and hosted karaoke shall be permitted inside the establishment on Fridays and Saturdays from 7:00 p.m. to 1:30 a.m.

- 4. If the Public Safety Director determines that the operation of the business negatively impacts the public peace, health, safety, or general welfare, the City Council shall have the authority to review the City Council Permit, and may revoke, suspend, or modify the Permit in order to protect the public peace, health, safety, and general welfare.
- 5. No change or alteration to the approved entertainment format shall occur without prior written approval from the City of Paramount.
- 6. The maximum number of occupants shall be established by the Fire Marshall according to each specific entertainment use and floor plan. A maximum occupancy placard shall be posted in a conspicuous location on the premises. This occupancy limitation shall not be violated.
- 7. It shall be unlawful for any person, who is intoxicated, or under the influence of any drug, to enter, be at, or remain upon the licensed premises as set forth in Section 25602(a) of the Business and Professions Code.
- 8. The person designated to be responsible for the operation of the business shall not perform official police or investigative activities but shall immediately report every violation of law and every unusual occurrence to the Sheriff's Station.
- 9. Karaoke provided shall not be audible beyond the area under control of the applicant. Karaoke shall not disturb the neighbors. No amplified sound equipment shall be installed on the exterior of the building.
- 10. During the hours of karaoke, the owner, the manager, or a designated responsible person 21 years of age or older shall be on the premises and shall be responsible for the operations during the hours of karaoke. This person shall possess on their person a valid driver license or identification card issued by the California Department of Motor Vehicles. This person shall also be able to communicate effectively with regulatory officials and have the ability to immediately contact the owner. The person will immediately introduce himself or herself to any regulatory officials.
- 11. The owners, managers, and persons designated to be responsible for the operation of the business shall cooperate fully with all City of Paramount officials, law enforcement personnel, and Code Enforcement officers, and shall not obstruct or impede their entrance into the licensed premises while in the course of their official duties.
- 12. No open bottles of distilled spirits shall be stored on the premises for specific customers.
- 13. No employee or agent shall be permitted to accept money or any other thing of value from a customer for the purpose of sitting or otherwise spending time with customers while on the premises, nor shall the licensee provide, permit, or make available male or female persons who act as escorts, companions, or guests of and for the customers, either with or without compensation.
- 14. No employee or agent shall solicit or accept any alcoholic or non-alcoholic beverage from any customer while on the premises.

- 15. There shall be no selling of alcoholic beverages for future compensation.
- 16. Any graffiti painted or marked upon the premises or on any adjacent area under the control of the licensee shall be immediately removed or painted over to match the predominant surface color.
- 17. No obstructions shall be attached, fastened, or connected to either the partitions or ceiling to separate the interior space of the licensed premises.
- 18. No self-service of alcoholic beverages shall be permitted.
- 19. No person under the age of 21 shall sell or deliver alcoholic beverages.
- 20. The entire premises are subject to inspection by the Sheriff's Department and the City of Paramount at any time. Any locked or otherwise secured rooms shall be opened upon demand.
- 21. The approved floor plan shall not be changed without prior approval by the Community Development Department and the Sheriff's Department.
- 22. All required permits and licenses from all relevant regulating bodies shall be valid at all times. A copy of all licenses, permits, and conditions shall be posted and maintained in a place conspicuous and readable by all employees and customers of the business.
- 23. All doors shall be kept closed during the karaoke hours except for ingress and egress.
- 24. No outside loitering shall be allowed on the premises. A professionally fabricated sign indicating as such shall continue to be posted.
- 25. The business owner(s) and property owner(s) shall be responsible for maintaining free of litter the area adjacent to the premises over which they have control.
- 26. The applicant shall maintain all necessary approvals from the Department of Alcoholic Beverage Control (ABC).
- 27. A maximum of one pool table may be maintained on the premises.
- 28. A single jukebox may be maintained upon the premises; however, the music shall not be audible outside the premises.
- 29. The Public Safety Department shall review and approve the security camera locations and orientations, including comprehensive camera views of the establishment interior, exterior, and parking lot. The approved cameras or more technologically advanced versions of the approved cameras shall be maintained in perpetuity. In the event of an incident and upon request, the business owners shall allow unimpeded inspection of the security camera system to Sheriff's Department and City of Paramount personnel.
- 30. All exterior signage requires review and approval by the Community Development Department.

- 31. Human signs, sign walkers, and sign spinners are prohibited on the property and the public rights-of-way.
- 32. The outdoor trash receptacles shall be painted following separate Community Development Department review and approval of the paint color.
- 33. Special events, including but not limited to events produced or administered by independent promoters, shall be reviewed in accordance with Special Event Permit regulations by the Community Development Department. The applicant shall submit a Special Event Permit application at least two weeks in advance of a proposed event.
- 34. An active City of Paramount business license shall be maintained.
- 35. Revisions to an existing City Council Permit require separate review and approval by the City Council. City Council Permits expire upon sale or transfer of the business to a new business owner.
- 36. Failure to comply with the above conditions and/or any applicable laws shall be cause for the modification, suspension, or revocation of this permit.
- 37. The City Council shall conduct a six-month review at its January 5, 2016 meeting.

On January 25, 2018, the Director of Public Works opened and examined the bids for the City Council Chambers remodel and video system upgrades and installation. The bids were opened at 11:00 AM in the Public Works office.

Two (2) bids were received and the apparent low bid submitted by Jason Golson Construction, amounted to \$24,800. The high bid was in the amount of \$42,393.37. The project was added to the Capital Improvement budget at the December 2017 City Council meeting and will coincide with other improvements underway in the Council Chambers this year.

In the last year, we have replaced the audio portion of the presentation system. This last phase of the upgrade will include removing the existing rear-projection screen and replacing it with two (2) 90-inch monitors. The monitors will be located within alcoves that will be built into the north and south side of the rear wall located behind the Council Chamber dais. Additional work to be completed as part of this project will include the reconfiguration of the existing dais in the Council Chambers. This will realign all existing directors' seating to the outer edges of the Council Chambers in a U-shaped configuration. All changes to the dais will be made to match the existing look and finish of the original dais. Lastly, the step-down landing in the adjacent corridor located to the south of the Council Chambers will be infilled to create a uniform landing. This will allow added accessibility from the main City Hall building to the Council Chambers.

Attached is a list of bidders.

Recommended Action

It is recommended that the City Council award the contract for the City Council Chambers remodel and video system upgrades and installation to Jason Golson Construction, Newport Beach, California, in the amount of \$24,800, and authorize the Mayor or her designee to execute the agreement.



Subject: Updated Facility Use Policy

As part of our continuing effort to put into place rules that govern the use of our City facilities, we are proposing an updated rate and use structure for the facilities we have not yet addressed with the City Council. Specifically, we are requesting approval on a fee and use structure for Progress Plaza East and the smaller meeting rooms located at the following 3 facilities: Paramount Park Community Center, Clearwater Building, and Progress Plaza West. Attached for your review is a Facility Use Summary of our rental facilities that provides a comprehensive view of our current and proposed rate structure and allowed users.

Background

On June 7, 2016, the City Council adopted new facility use fees and allowed uses for the auditoriums at Paramount Park Community Center, Progress Plaza West and the Clearwater Building. The approved fees and allowed uses the City Council approved were limited to specified weekend uses by the general public. While the Paramount Park Community Center had no specific limitations to its type of uses, Progress Plaza West was limited to resident-only wedding and funeral receptions and the Clearwater Building was limited to resident-only wedding and funeral receptions as well as baby and wedding shower-type activities. Both Progress Plaza West and Clearwater were made available to the general public on a 1-year trial basis. Since we did not experience any issues with the few general public rentals of these buildings over this trial period, we are recommending that we continue to make these facilities available to the general public according to the specific use limitations and fees previously set by the City Council.

On October 4, 2016, the City Council reviewed a report that identified additional proposed uses that might be requested for weekend use at all three facilities as well as weekday use at Progress Plaza West and the Clearwater Building. The City Council approved allowed uses by service clubs, churches, non-profits, and local businesses. Specifically, the City Council approved the weekday use by these groups at the Paramount Park Community Center, Progress Plaza West, and the Clearwater Building at no charge. However, a basic fee structure for these groups was approved by the City Council for weekend auditorium use that consists of a refundable deposit, insurance, setup/cleanup fees for dining events, pass through costs for linen use, and individually contracted security for alcohol events. The Paramount Unified School District and the Chamber of Commerce are not included in the facility use policy.

We are now seeking guidance from the City Council on the fee and use structure for Progress Plaza East and the smaller meeting rooms at the Paramount Park Community Center, Clearwater Building, and Progress Plaza West.

Definitions

In this report and on the Facility Use Summary, we have identified opportunities for single-day uses and multi-day uses:

- Single-day uses are one-day events that do not carry over into any consecutive day (e.g., the Boy Scouts meet one day per week every week). The single-day use caps for the groups vary and are generally reflective of previous uses by the various organizations.
- Multi-day uses refer to events that use the facility on consecutive days (e.g., Traditional Artist Guild will use Progress Plaza for 2 weeks straight for their art show).

Clearwater Building

1. Auditorium

The groups eligible for use of the 2nd floor auditorium at this facility are: residents, community organizations, Gateway Council of Governments (COG), and local businesses. The City Council has already provided direction for resident and community organizations use of the auditorium at Clearwater. Overall, the Gateway COG is our largest user of this facility, averaging around 100 uses per year at no charge. We are proposing a fee and use structure for the Gateway COG and local businesses as reflected in the attached Facility Use Summary. We are also requesting that single-day use caps be established that limits individual residents to 2 uses per year and 24 for community organizations and local businesses. Multi-day uses would not be allowed. Additionally, we are requesting that any event sponsored by a local service club that involves non-Paramount partners be subject to a \$25 per hour use fee, insurance, a refundable deposit, and a \$40 setup fee.

The Gateway COG operates offices out of Clearwater and will not have a use cap for use of the 2nd floor auditorium. However, the newly proposed hourly fee may impact the number of previously free uses. The Gateway COG will continue to use the downstairs offices of the Clearwater Building under an existing lease agreement. The 2nd floor auditorium is not part of the COG's lease agreement and would be subject to the requirements stated in the Facility Use Summary.

2. Board Room

On the 1st floor of the Clearwater Building, the City also has a Board Room available for use. The groups eligible for use of the Board Room at this facility are: community organizations, local HOAs, the Gateway COG, and local businesses. There are no fees for use of the Board Room by these groups and it is available on weekdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Weekend use is not available. Community organizations and local businesses would be capped at 24 single-day uses in a year and local HOAs would be capped at 12 single-day uses in a year. Multi-day uses would not be allowed.

The Gateway COG would not be subject to a use cap for the Board Room but would still be required to request use of this room.

Progress Plaza East (PPE)

1. Meeting Rooms

On the attached Facility Use Summary for Progress Plaza East, we have identified 6 groups that are eligible for use of the facility: resident, community organizations (defined as local service clubs, churches, non-profits that serve Paramount, government agencies, and quasi-government agencies), local Home Owner Associations (HOAs), youth leagues, local businesses, and youth non-profits (defined as groups like the Boy and Girl Scouts). We are proposing only the resident and local business uses be subject to an hourly fee. Resident uses will be limited to weekend use between 8 a.m. and 10 p.m. All other groups are eligible for use of the facility on weekdays from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. and weekends from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Local businesses, however, are not eligible for weekend use and their weekday use is limited from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Residents are capped at 2 uses per year per applicant to: a) avoid the possibility that resident applicants will reserve and book the facility for non-resident uses, and b) because uses are limited to weekends only which creates a smaller pool of available dates. In regard to local business use, we are proposing to cap the single and multi-day use at 60 days per year and any approval of a multi-day use would take into consideration any current facility bookings that would be in conflict with the request. Any local business request beyond 60 days would be evaluated as a short-term lease and billed at current commercial market lease rates. These requests would also be evaluated to determine if the request had any impact on current facility bookings.

2. Board Room

The Board Room at Progress Plaza East is eligible to all the groups, except residents. There are no fees for use of the conference room by these groups and it is available from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. Weekend use is available to these groups, except local businesses, from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. and they are all capped at 20 single-day uses in a year. Only community organizations and local businesses would be eligible for multi-day uses and it would be capped at 20 uses in a year.

Paramount Park Community Center (PPCC)

1. Auditorium

The groups eligible for use of the auditorium at this facility are: residents, non-residents, community organizations, and youth leagues. The City Council has already provided direction for residents, non-residents, and community organizations use of the auditorium at the Paramount Park Community Center. For clarity, however, we are requesting that the City Council also approve the use of the auditorium at the Paramount Park Community Center for youth leagues to conduct award events, meetings, and fundraising events per the requirements identified in the attached Facility Use Summary. We are also requesting that single-day use caps be established that limits individual residents to 2 uses per year, 1 for non-residents, and 2 each for community organizations and youth leagues. Multi-day uses are not allowed.

We are also requesting that we adjust our security requirements from the current levels of 1 security guard for alcohol events of less than 150 guests and 2 security guards for alcohol events of more than 150 guests. Because of the physical setup of the Community Center

and the number of exit points, we are recommending the current level of security requirements be adjusted to 1 security guard per 100 guests for alcohol events.

2. Meeting Rooms

The groups eligible for use of the meeting rooms at this facility are: residents, non-residents, community organizations, youth leagues, local businesses, and youth non-profits. Fees would apply only to the residents, non-residents, and local business uses. Weekday use from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m. would be available to all groups except residents and non-residents. All groups would be eligible for weekend use of the meeting rooms except for local businesses under the structure and caps identified in the Facility Use Summary. Single-day uses would be set at 2 for residents and non-residents and the other eligible groups would be capped at 25 uses per year. Multi-day uses would not be allowed.

We are also requesting that we adjust our security requirements from the current levels of 1 security guard for alcohol events of less than 150 guests and 2 security guards for alcohol events of more than 150 guests. Because of the physical setup of the Community Center and the number of exit points, we are recommending the current level of security requirements be adjusted to 1 security guard per 100 guests for alcohol events.

Progress Plaza West

1. Auditorium

The groups eligible for use of the auditorium at this facility are: residents, community organizations, Gateway COG, and local businesses. The City Council has already provided direction for resident and community organizations use of the auditorium at Progress Plaza West. We are proposing a fee and use structure for local businesses as reflected in the attached Facility Use Summary. We are also requesting that single-day use caps be established that limits individual residents to 2 uses per year and 24 for community organizations with the exception for service clubs that would be capped at 50 days per year. The Gateway COG would be capped at 10 uses. Multi-day uses would be allowed only for community organizations and that would be capped at 24. Additionally, we are requesting that any event sponsored by a local service club that involves non-Paramount partners be subject to a \$25 per hour use fee, insurance, a refundable deposit, and a \$40 setup fee.

2. Board Room

The groups eligible for use of the Board Room at this facility are: community organizations, Gateway COG, and local businesses. There are no fees for use of the conference room by these groups and it is available on weekdays from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. Weekend use is only available to community organizations from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. We are also requesting that single-day use caps be established for the Gateway COG to 5 uses per year and 24 for local businesses and community organizations with the exception for service clubs that would be capped at 50 days per year. The disparity in the caps between community organizations/local businesses and the Gateway COG for use of Progress Plaza West's Board Room is due to the very open availability of the Clearwater Building to the COG and its meeting needs.

Multi-day uses would be allowed for both community organizations and local businesses but would be capped at 24 days per year.

Consistent with past Facility Use Policies, we also recommend providing the Community Services and Recreation Director with discretion to waive fees and use limitations as necessary to meet a community need or a specific request that is supportive of the City Council's goals.

Excluded Uses

It has always been the City's intention that the facilities identified in our Facility Use Policy are to be a nonpublic forum and not a designated public forum or other type of public forum for public communication or expressive activity for purposes of political or religious expression. Such uses are not allowed. However, facility use requests that are information-only presentations, such as Congresswoman Roybal-Allard's presentation on MediCal, or Senator Lara's presentation of Citizens of the Year, have historically been allowable. Additionally, while the City allows non-profit groups, including religious groups, use of these facilities, use of a facility by such groups for an actual religious service or for advocacy of specific political candidate(s), initiative(s) or similar issue(s) is not allowed. We are requesting that the City formalize these long standing policies regarding the prohibition of political or actual religious uses at Progress Plaza West, Progress Plaza East, Clearwater Building, and the Paramount Park Community Center.

Recommended Action

It is recommended that the City Council adopt the amendments to the Facility Use Policy as stated in this staff report.
