On October 5, 2017, Public Works staff opened and examined the bids for the provision of one (1) Ford F350 combination truck with an arrow board. The bids were opened at 11:00 AM in the Public Works office.

Four (4) bids were received and the apparent low bid submitted by Carmenita Truck Center amounted to \$50,551.67. Attached is a list of bidders.

We will be using financing through a Lease-To-Purchase agreement with Ford Credit to procure the vehicle. The terms of the agreement include a five (5) year payment plan with annual fees of \$11,178.93. The annual interest rate is set at 4.70%. At the end of the five (5) year term, the City of Paramount will be allowed to purchase the vehicle for a cost of \$1 each. The cost of the lease is \$578.93 above the budgeted amount of, \$10,600. This increase in budget will be funded by the City's Equipment Replacement Fund and will be adjusted in the midyear budget.

Recommended Action

On October 5, 2017, Public Works staff opened and examined the bids for the provision of one (1) Ford F250 pick-up truck with arrow board. The bids were opened at 11:00 AM in the Public Works office.

Three (3) bids were received and the apparent low bid submitted by Fritts Ford amounted to \$36,052.86. Attached is a list of bidders.

We will be using financing through a Lease-To-Purchase agreement with Ford Credit to procure the vehicle. The terms of the agreement include a five (5) year payment plan with annual fees of \$8,006.88. The annual interest rate is set at 4.70%. At the end of the five (5) year term, the City of Paramount will be allowed to purchase the vehicle for a cost of \$1 each. The cost of the lease is \$1,993.12 below the budgeted amount of, \$10,000.

Four (4) bids were received and the apparent low bid submitted by Fritts Ford amounted to \$90,349.75. Attached is a list of bidders.

We will be using financing through a Lease-To-Purchase agreement with Ford Credit to procure the vehicle. The terms of the agreement include a five (5) year payment plan with annual fees of \$19,885.95. The annual interest rate is set at 4.70%. At the end of the five (5) year term, the City of Paramount will be allowed to purchase the vehicle for a cost of \$1 each. The cost of the lease is \$4,314.05 below the budgeted amount of, \$24,200.

Subject: PROVISION OF INDOOR AIR FILTERS AND GRANT OPPORTUNITIES

As part of the City's response to air quality issues in the community, staff has been asked to explore providing and funding indoor air filters for residents and to seek grant opportunities for this equipment. Working with our partners at the South Coast Air Quality Management District (AQMD), Los Angeles County Department of Public Health (DPH), and other environmental agencies and organizations, we now have information in which to consider.

As was previously mentioned in updates to the City Council, earlier this summer, DPH took indoor air samples from three homes in areas of the City that have been impacted the most by outdoor air quality issues. The samples were both air samples and samples of dust particles found on surfaces inside the homes. The samples taken by DPH were sent to DPH's lab for processing and the results were discussed with City staff at a meeting in September.

The sampling of indoor air quality by DPH was conducted to determine whether there were any public health hazards within these homes that would require immediate attention. DPH indicated to staff that based on their sampling, there was no public health hazard relative to the quality of indoor air. DPH said that all of the samples came back within acceptable levels with only one sample testing positive for Hexavalent Chromium. The sample with Hexavalent Chromium was considered to be at a very low level. DPH indicated that they did not find any air quality issues within these homes and that secondary air filtration devices were not necessary for health and safety purposes. DPH also indicated that addressing outdoor air quality was the most effective way to ensure that indoor air quality remains at satisfactory levels. At this point in time, based on the data, DPH indicated to staff that they are not planning additional indoor air quality tests.

As direction had been given to explore air filter options, staff determined that it would be appropriate to retain a Certified Industrial Hygienist to provide specific guidance on filter types, their use, and their effectiveness. A Certified Industrial Hygienist was retained through the firm Pacific EH and S (Pacific), for their expertise in providing air quality analysis and in determining the type of filtration equipment appropriate for the situation. Certified Industrial Hygienists are scientists and engineers who evaluate the environment for purposes of recommending and implementing practices that protect the health and safety of people. Industrial Hygienists are trained to evaluate air quality data and to make recommendations relative to reducing hazards and improving safety. Pacific's review of DPH's sampling analysis confirmed DPH's findings. Pacific agreed with DPH that there was not a specific hazard identified in the DPH indoor air samples. The use of air filters was not recommended by Pacific as a necessity, however, filters certainly could be used as a matter of personal preference.

If secondary air filters were to be used or provided by the City, Pacific did provide the following recommendations:

1. If air filtrations units are used, all windows to the room and or the house will need to be closed for optimal filtration and effectiveness.
2. Air filtration units should be sized for the room they are intended to clean. Most units state the square footage or floor space they are intended to properly work in. Some homes may require multiple units for multiple rooms. It is recommended units be placed where residents spend most of their time.
3. Air filtration units should be equipped with changeable "HEPA" filtration. Some units may be branded with other terms, such as "HEPA Clean," "Air Cleaner," "Air Purifier," "Pet Purifier," "Odor Purifier," etc. Only purchase air filtration units that are labeled "True HEPA," as that is the recognized standard.
4. HEPA filters are technically required to capture up to 99.97% of particles of 0.3 microns or larger from the air that passes through the filter. A HEPA filter will filter metal particulates and is the most appropriate type of filter for contaminantes such as Hexavalent Chromium
5. Avoid additional carbon or charcoal filtration, ion, ionic, static discharge, sanitizer, deodorizer, germ-eliminator, UV light, add-ons, as they will not appreciably make the unit better and there will ultimately be more parts/filters to replace or more parts to break.

Based on the recommendations given by Pacific, room based air filters meeting the above referenced performance criteria can cost between \$150 and \$250 per unit. These units are also easily available for purchase on-line and in many department and hardware stores. The HEPA filters will need to be changed according to the manufacturer's recommendation, approximately once per year, and cost about \$20-\$30 per filter. As an added benefit, these filters will also filter out the smell of burning metal and other odors associated with metal forging.

Air Filter Grants

At the same time that we were looking at air filter options, City staff has been reaching out to find grant opportunities. Various community groups, foundations, non-profits, and vendors were contacted to determine potential funding sources for the provision of air filters to residents, should the City Council decide to take that course of action. As the City Council is aware, Supervisor Janice Hahn's office had previously indicated that they may be able to provide some funding for air filters. It is our understanding that Supervisor Hahn's office was waiting for the results from the County Health Department's indoor air sampling to make a final determination on funding. At this point we are awaiting word on the Supervisor's decision.

We have also reached out to a variety of groups who have either health related missions or groups involved in social justice efforts. None of these groups had specific funding available for air filters at this time. In almost all cases, funding would be directed towards the mitigation of specific air quality problems. The lack of an identified air quality problem in the DPH testing

does significantly reduce the merits of any grant application. We have also found that many groups have funding allocated for up to a year in advance, with budgets established well in advance. Other groups do not provide grant opportunities or grants cannot be solicited, rather groups have to be invited to apply for a grant by the granting organization. The following groups or organizations have been contacted to inquire about funding opportunities for indoor air filters:

In a separate but related note, we were also recently notified that the City has been awarded a grant from the Port of Long Beach. The grant application was submitted in conjunction with IQ Air, an air filter vendor, and only organizations whose facilities serve populations sensitive to diesel emissions like children, and teens. The port's grant program is intended to mitigate pollutants, specifically diesel emissions coming from large trucks traveling to and from the port. The grant will fund a secondary filtration unit that will be installed at the Spane Park Learning Center, which falls within the port's Community Impact Study's "affected region", and the grant program's priority zone. The priority zone is adjacent to the I-710 corridor on both the east and west sides, and includes communities impacted by more than 5% of port-related truck traffic which makes it a "high impact" area.

Recommended Action

It is recommended that the City Council provide direction on the provision of air filters and the continuance of grant funding research.

Subject: Recording, Live Streaming, and Archiving of City Council Meetings and City Council Chamber Improvements

Background

At the direction of the City Council, a survey was conducted in July 2017 on how many cities in the surrounding region record and live stream their City Council meetings. Attached is a copy of the survey. The survey revealed that an overwhelming majority of these cities record their City Council meetings. The City has researched potential options for recording, live streaming, and archiving of City Council meetings. The result of this research is presented below.

There are three major components that are required for the successful recording, live streaming, and archiving of City Council meetings: operator, hardware, and software. An operator is required to use the recording equipment. The hardware will be the physical equipment required to record the meetings and compress the recording to allow live streaming. The software will provide the platform to stream, view, and store the recordings.

The goal is to make City Council meetings available to the widest viewership in the most cost effective manner. After evaluating potential options, below are staff's recommendations:

Hardware

Staff is recommending a single camera system that would provide a fixed view of the City Council from the rear of the City Council Chambers. The City would also have to purchase a content management server to broadcast the City Council meetings on the City's dedicated cable TV channel. Additionally, an encoder would be purchased in order to live stream the content online. The City would also purchase a switcher in order to plug PowerPoint presentations into the feed, so instead of capturing the projector screen, the viewer would see the PowerPoint as if it were on the computer monitor.

Operator

To avoid the cost of hiring a contractor, City staff would operate the single camera system from within the City Council Chambers. Once the system is installed and staff is familiar with operating the system, operating the video system should not require a contractor. However, revisiting the possibility of hiring a contractor is always available.

Software

There are companies that provide video archiving and live stream services. Granicus is one that is widely-used by cities. Granicus, however, has a steep monthly cost that increases depending upon the features chosen. In comparison, YouTube, which is also used by other cities, has no cost. Both have the ability to link an agenda item to jump the viewer to the section of the video when the item is clicked (both platforms also require a staff member to manually create these links).

Staff also considered the idea of using Facebook Live. However, since YouTube is more widely-used and can be shared via Facebook, the complexity of running multiple live streams does not warrant the use of Facebook Live.

Access to Online Content

The City would not only be using YouTube to live stream City Council meetings, but to save and archive the meeting videos as well. This content would be accessible on the City's YouTube channel. Additionally, the videos would be hyperlinked on the City's website. When clicked, these hyperlinks would take the viewer directly to the YouTube video for the selected meeting. City Council meeting videos can be organized by year and month and can be stored indefinitely.

Cable TV

As a result of State franchise laws, cities get a percentage of fees from cable companies annually, which are called PEG (Public, Educational, and Governmental) funds. Spectrum Cable is forcing all cities that have access to PEG funds to digitally transmit their recordings. To do so, Spectrum must run fiber optic lines into City Hall, which will cost approximately \$35,000. This expense is covered by the PEG funds the City receives from Spectrum's consumers. Cities must also control the entire channel, from managing the content to setting the schedule of programming. The City must lease an encoder from Spectrum to operate the channel at a monthly cost of around \$600, which is not covered by PEG funds.

Provided that some residents may have access to cable only and not internet, it is recommended that City Council meetings are live broadcasted and replayed on the cable channel designated for the City once the system is operable. The channel's content would be managed by City staff.

City Council Chamber Improvements

A redesign of a portion of the City Council Chambers is recommended to improve the presentation of meetings to the community. An oral presentation of the proposed improvements will be given at the October 17th meeting.

Fiscal Impact

The entire live broadcasting project will cost between \$50,000 and \$75,000 depending on the vendor the City chooses after evaluating the proposals. This amount does not include the work for the City Council Chamber improvements. The City would pay for these projects with PEG funds. The City receives about \$35,000 annually and currently the PEG account has a balance of approximately \$265,000. These funds, however, may only be spent on capital costs related to providing public access to content on the City's channel. Existing PEG funds should be sufficient to cover the costs of both the camera system and the City Council Chamber improvements.

Recommended Action

It is recommended that the City Council direct staff to move forward with the work for recording, live streaming, and archiving City Council meetings, and with the City Council Chamber Improvements and to return with recommendations for awards of contract.
