- The media portrays speeding as fun and exciting
- The truth is the consequences can be emotionally damaging
- As of 2020 Los Angeles have seen an increase in street racing and sideshows
- The California Highway Patrol (CHP) responded to 25,953 calls involving speed contest or exhibition of speed.

- Bill AB-3 in effect
- Drivers and passengers between the ages of 18 to 44, who data show are most likely to be involved in speeding related crashes.

As of July, the number of races and street takeovers across Los Angeles had jumped 27% *in* 2021, according to the Los Angeles Police Department.

 Speeding continues to be the number one cited driver-related factor in highway fatal crashes



Controlling for Aedes Mosquitoes

Challenges of Invasive Aedes

- Have rapidly spread throughout California.
- Found in every city in LA County
- Prefer smaller water sources, making them harder to control
- They lay their eggs in water sources in people's front yards, backyards, and patios
 - Areas where mosquito control agencies can't easily inspect


Impacts of Aedes

- Impact the quality of life and how residents spend time outdoors
- Increase the risk of additional mosquito diseases entering the county
 - Zika
 - Dengue
 - Chikungunya
 - Yellow Fever
 - Dog heartworm



What is SIT?


- Environmentally-friendly insect pest control method
- A non-chemical control method
- The basic steps of SIT are:
 - Sterilization of a target pest (mosquitoes),
 - Release of sterile males in a specific area over time
 - Sterile males will mate with wild females
- The SIT technique results in no offspring and a declining pest population, reducing the presence the specific breed of virus-spreading mosquitoes

What you need to know

- Male mosquitoes do not bite and can not transmit diseases
- SIT will not eliminate the use of other chemicals to control for mosquitoes.
- SIT only targets one specific type of mosquito
 - Aedes aegypti
- SIT releases will have to be ongoing every mosquito season
- The District is evaluating the use of SIT and has not decided on a technique or when it would be used





There is no information or evidence to suggest that COVID-19 could be transmitted by mosquitoes.

GET RID OF STANDING WATER AROUND YOUR HOME

 Once a week – empty and scrub, turn over, cover or throw out any items that hold water.

- Tip and Toss any standing water (indoors and outdoors)
- REMOVE, SCRUB, FLIP OVER, or COVER any dirty containers that can hold water
- Drill a hole at the bottom of open containers










2022 Unsheltered Geography












Duration of Homelessness






City Where Respondent Usually Sleeps



93.0% of respondents usually sleep in the city of **Paramount**.





Background

- Since 2019, Paramount has seen its homeless population decrease from:
 - 105 individuals in 2019
 - 85 individuals in 2020
 - 59 individuals in 2022
- This 44% reduction in individuals experiencing homelessness can be attributed to:
 - City Homeless Plan
 - Expanded partnerships with non-profit organizations
 - Daily outreach connecting homeless neighbors to service providers






Key takeaways from the Homeless Census:



- 51% expressed interest in Case Management
- 40% expressed interest in Shelter
- 40% expressed interest in Outreach



Fiscal Impact

- The cost to enter into this agreement with the Salvation Army Bell Shelter is \$207,252.
- A budget allocation to cover the cost of this agreement is included in the adopted Fiscal Year 2023 Budget.
- This budget allocation is funded through the City's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA).





Recommendation

It is recommended that the City Council approve and authorize the Mayor or City Manager to enter into the agreement with the Salvation Army Bell Shelter in the amount of \$207,252.

VISION, MISSION, VALUES, AND STRATEGIC OUTCOMES

Background

- The Youth Activities League (YAL) is a nonprofit from the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department.
- In September 2021, through a partnership between the City of Paramount, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department, and the Los Angeles County Probation Department the YAL Program opened its doors in Paramount.







YAL Program

- Homework assistance through a partnership with the PEP program.
- The Program also offers a variety of activities for the youth which includes: Arts and Crafts, Excursions, Life Skills, Mentoring, and Fitness.







Memorandum of Understanding

Through the County of Los Angeles, the City was awarded a grant through the Juvenile Justice Crime Prevention Act (JJCPA).

The Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the County of Probation will provide the grant funding for the YAL Program.

The County grant funds will provide for civilian contractors, excursions, a variety of professional services; and equipment and supplies.

The MOU is for \$185,009.00 for the YAL Program for the period of July 1, 2022 through June 30, 2023.



Breakdown of Awarded Funds

Personnel Costs - \$83,980.00


