Current Construction Projects

Student Services Building: The \$25.2 million facility will become a one-stop hub for all student services. The project involves the demolition of the old Library building, and construction of the new Student Services Building. Estimated Completion: Fall 2022





Current Construction Projects

Instructional Building 2: The \$25.6 million project involves the removal of Row Building D, and the remainder of Row E and F buildings, and construction of a second state-of-the-art instructional building on campus. Estimated Completion: Winter 2023





Future Construction Projects

Compton College Physical Education Complex: This \$45.6 million project includes the demolition of the current gymnasium, men's shower/locker, classroom V, pool service, pool, and women's shower/locker buildings; and the construction of a new gymnasium, men's and women's locker room, faculty office space, and physical education support space.





Future Construction Projects

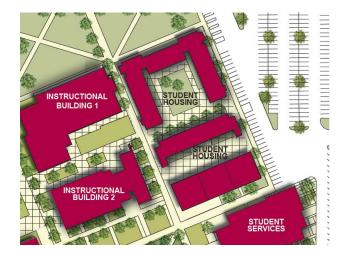
Compton College Visual and Performing Arts Complex: This \$13.4 million project includes a new facility to support music, dance, performing arts, film and video programs. Strategic placement of this new facility, adjacent to the renovated Little Theater, provides space for an outdoor courtyard.





Future Construction Projects

On June 26, 2022, California lawmakers moved to include a student housing grant totaling \$80,389,000 in the 2022-2023 State Budget for the Compton Community College District (CCCD) to build its proposed **250-bed student** housing facility on the Compton College campus.



- The proposed Compton College student housing will be located at the northeast corner of campus.
- Phase one of the 86,000-square-foot building will include four floors of affordable student living quarters with 100 percent occupancy earmarked for eligible low-income students.
- The facility will provide three types of living configurations: 50 double-room units with access to shared bathrooms and common spaces, 50 double-suite units with bathrooms and access to common spaces, and 50 studio units for single occupants for a combined total of 250 beds.
- Amenity spaces will include study areas/lounges, and shared kitchens.
- Phase two of this student housing project will include an additional 200 beds with a mix of double and single occupancy units.



Vaccine Incentive

Ongoing distribution of \$350 Vaccination Incentive for students:

• \$1,023,050 distributed to 2,923 students

The student vaccination requirement ends January 1, 2023.

• Proof of full vaccination status will no longer be required for in-person classes beginning with the winter 2023 term.

- Compton College continues its partnership with Everytable, providing weekly meal deliveries to students.
- Everytable Cafeteria opened February 14 Students may pick up one free meal daily Monday-Thursday for the entire 2022-2023 academic year.



Steps to Enrollment

Virtual and in-person/on-campus enrollment services available.







- The Compton College Oliver W. Conner Promise Program was established to make a college education more accessible and affordable to high school graduates from the Compton, Lynwood and Paramount unified school districts.
- The College Promise program covers the first two years of enrollment fees at Compton College, beginning with the fall semester, after you graduate from high school.



Benefits Include:

- Guaranteed admission to Compton College.
- \$400 per year for textbooks and course materials and supplies.
- **Tablet/laptop loan program** during the first two years at Compton College. Students are allowed to keep their college-issued tablet/laptop if they are enrolled full-time at census for the third semester.
- **Priority registration** at Compton College before graduating from high school for CUSD, LUSD, and PUSD seniors.
- **Opportunities to participate in support programs** such as the First Year Experience (FYE) and Extended Opportunity Programs and Services (EOPS).
- Assistance with the completion of a **Financial Fit Plan** to help high school graduates access all available financial aid to help pay for college.
- Summer Bridge classes to assist with a successful transition to college level courses.

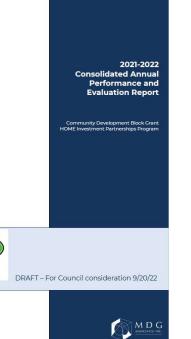

- Paramount has been an "entitlement city" since 1997
- Annual review of City's progress in meeting specific goals & objectives outlined in the 1-Year/5-Year Consolidated Plan

City budgeted: \$777,492 in CDBG funds \$300,303 in HOME funds \$935,242 in CDBG-CV funds \$97,313 reallocated funds to the Homelessness

- Fair Housing/Code Enforcement/Graffiti Removal/Residential Rehab (Home Improvement Program)/Commercial Rehab Projects

 - 238% (more than double) of Fair Housing Services goal achieved
- Some goals almost complete
 - 40% of Home Improvement Program goal achieved (rolled into FY 2023)
 - 80% of commercial Code Enforcement inspection goal achieved
 - 91.43% of emergency business assistance goal achieved
- Accomplishments consistent with 5-year Consolidated Plan objectives

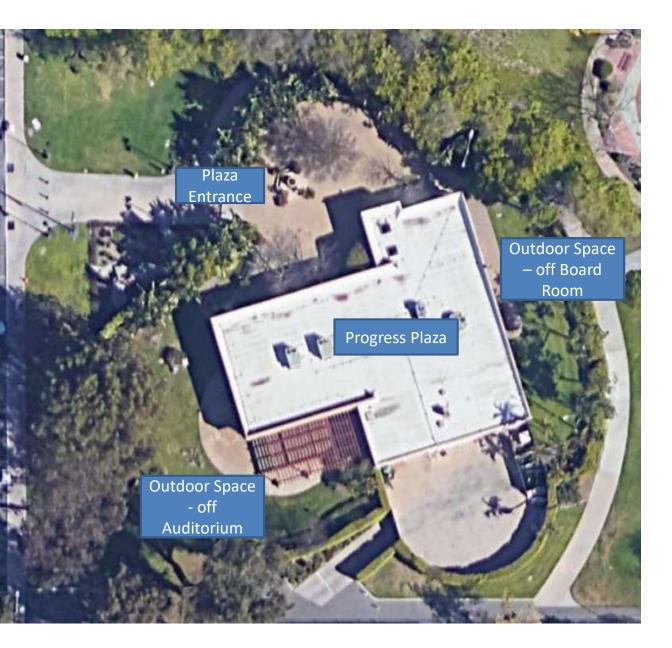

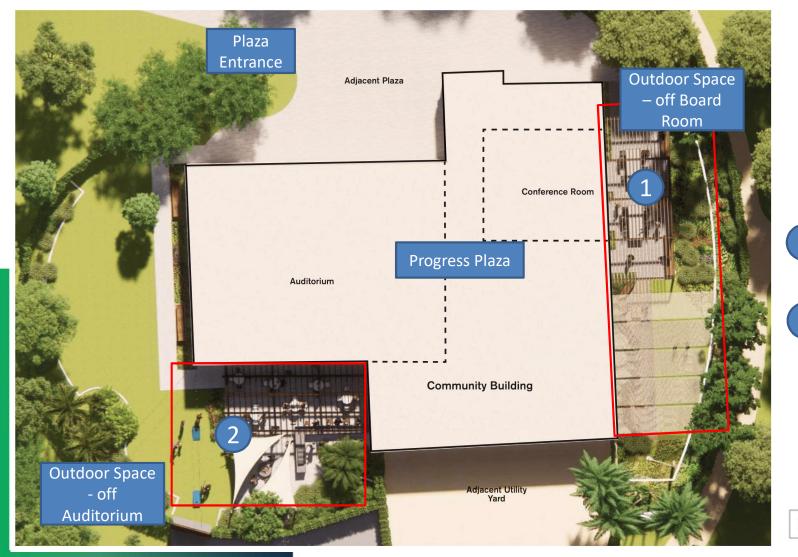

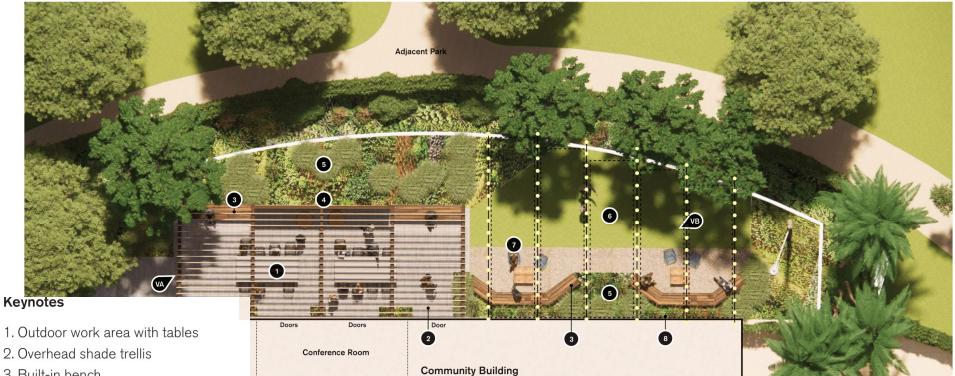


The Veranda - Existing Site Conditions

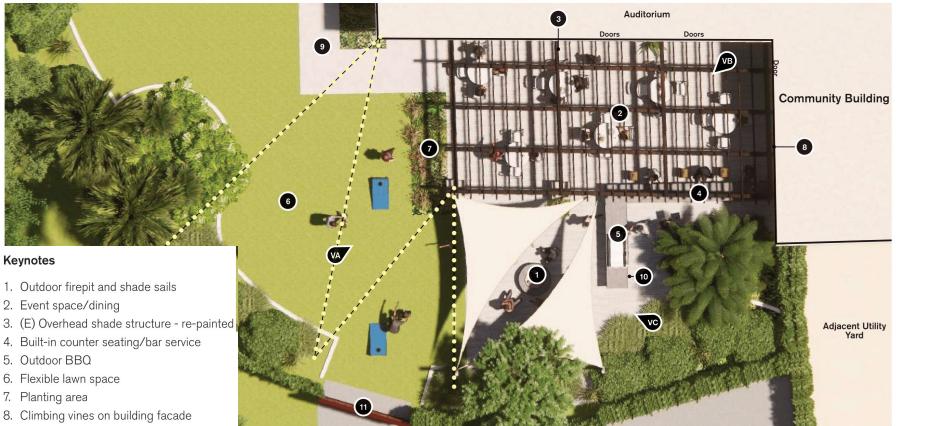

Background

- As a member of CPA, the City provides a better source of clean, and renewable energy to residents and businesses.
- November of 2018 City established its default rate:
 - 36% Lean Power renewable energy.
 - Became effective in the Spring of 2019.
- Paramount residents and businesses automatically enrolled, but can choose to opt in and/or out of any program.



Energy Tiers

• Currently CPA offers the following renewable tiers:

Renewable Energy Tier Percentage	New Renewable Energy Tier Name
36% Renewable Energy	Lean Power
50% Renewable Energy	Clean Power
100% Renewable Energy	100% Green Power

- The City has continued to push forward various energy efficiency projects:

- Continue to look for cleaner and renewable energy options

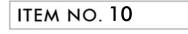

Rates and Tier Comparison

- Staff is recommending a change for its municipal accounts from the 36% Lean Power to the 100% Green Power Tier.
- Annual increase of approximately \$15,420 in energy costs.
 Projection based on CPA calculations
- No Fiscal Impact, as there is sufficient funding in electricity Budget.







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Climate Action Plan

- This change aligns with the City's Climate Action Plan.
 - Measure RE2: Promote and Maximize Community Choice Energy (CCE) and Utility Clean Energy Offerings.
 - Strategy RE2c:Collaborate with both Southern California Edison (SCE) and CPA to increase percentage of electricity from renewable systems.

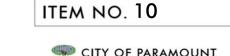

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Community Wide Default Rate

ITEM NO. 10

Community Default Rate

- This is an opportunity to consider possible transition of City default rate.
 - From 36% Lean Power to 50% Clean Power.
- Higher amount of electricity from a cleaner and renewable energy source for all (residents and businesses).



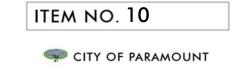
Rates and Tier Comparison

- Transition would result in an approximate 1% increase.
- The table below shows an example of the increase for a \$170 electricity bill.

Energy Product	July 2022 (Typical Bill)	% Difference Compared to SCE

Lean Power (Current)	\$170.46	-1%	
Clean Power (Proposed)	\$172.20	0.0%

CPA Programs

- Although the 50% Clean Power tier means a 1% increase, CPA provides discounts for qualifying communities.
 - Power Share Program Provides 100% Green Power and a 20% discount on monthly electricity bills.
- Continued outreach by CPA and City staff may increase enrollment in the community.
- Allows residents to benefit from 100% Green Power at discounted rate.

CPA Member Cities

- The majority of CPA member cities are enrolled in the100% Green Power tier.
- Staff recommends a gradual increase in tiers.
 - From 36% Lean Power to 50% Clean Power.
- If approved, default rate will become effective October 1, 2023.



• Residents and Businesses can opt up or down, or even out of the program, if they choose to do so.



Recommendation

It is recommended that the City Council receive and file the Clean Power Alliance Program Information report and:

- Direct staff to move the City's current municipal accounts from the 36% Lean Power tier into the 100% Green Power tier; and
- 2. Provide staff direction regarding changing the City's default rate to the 50% Clean Power tier;
