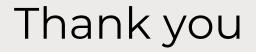

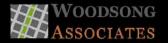

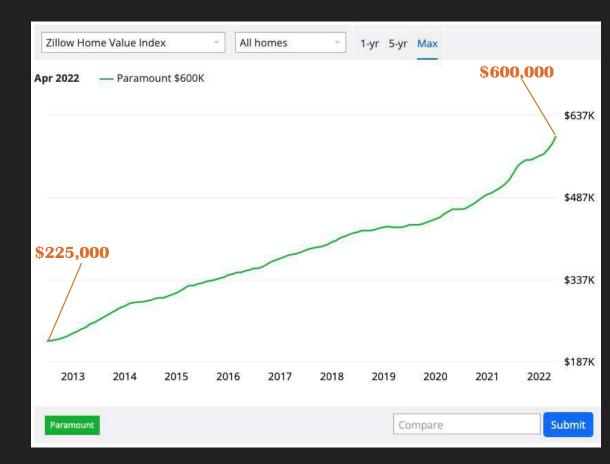

Paramount Home Price escalation

Paramount home prices have nearly tripled since 2013:

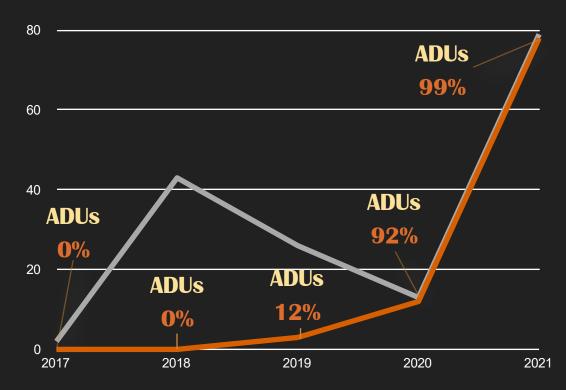
- Household incomes have not kept pace with home value appreciation
- ADUs provide an opportunity for lower-cost homes that match the scale of the neighborhood
- For this reason, and due to policy shifts, ADUs are gaining in popularity



Paramount ADU production history

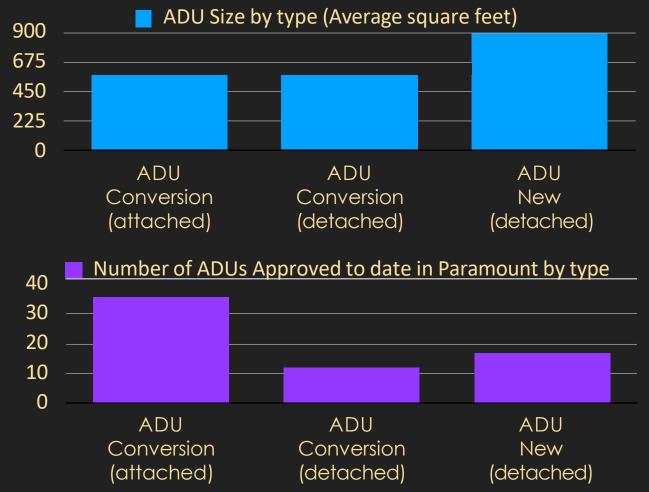
- Paramount ADU Production from 2017:
- In 2017, ADUs represented 0% of all homes permitted in Paramount
- That grew to 12% in 2019
- And 92% in 2020
- By 2021, ADUs represented
 99% of all new housing approved in Paramount

Paramount ADU Approvals — Paramount Total Housing Approvals



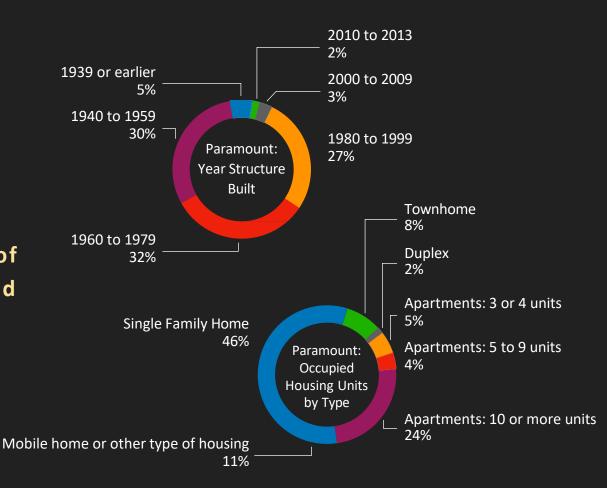
Paramount ADU production trends

- ADUs approved since 2018
 - New detached ADUs have the largest average size of any type approved in Paramount to date, at 898 sq ft
 - Attached conversion ADUs are the most popular type approved in Paramount to date



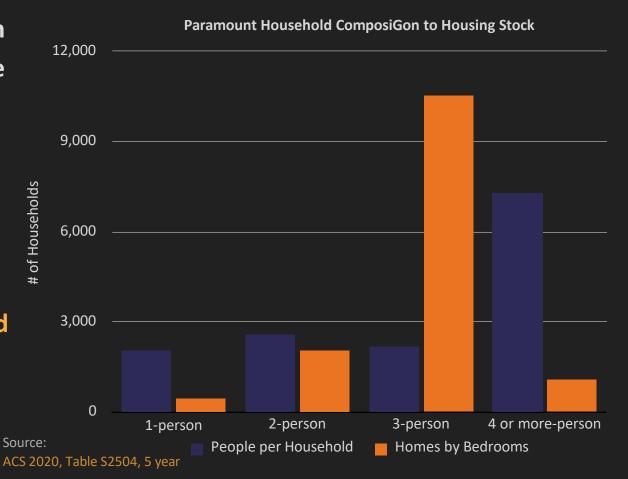
Paramount Housing by Structure Age and Type

- 46% of the households in Paramount live in a detached home
- 67% of the households in Paramount live in a home built prior to 1980
- Structures over 40 years of age are approach the need for a major remodel
- This represents the "ADU moment"



Paramount HH Size/ Bedroom Count Mismatch

- 75% of the households in Paramount live in a home with 2 or 3 bedrooms
- Yet, 52% of Paramount households have 4 or more people
- This indicates a large *
 potential pent-up demand for ADUs, to allow more room for multigenerational households Source:



State ADU law Mandatory Compliance Recommendations

ADU Design, Ordinance, and Approval Process:

- Cities must approve ADUs ministerially, rather than using a discretionary process, based on objective standards such as:
 - size, configuration, setback, and placement on the lot
- This means adjustments must be made to any elements of the ADU ordinance that may require a potentially-subjective determination, such as those that use the word "compatible" or "compatibility"
- If Paramount would like to continue to regulate elements of ADU design, then objective design standards must be developed to do so



State ADU law Mandatory Compliance Recommendations

ADU Height:

- Current minimum allowable maximum ADU height per ordinance:
 - ADU max height: 16 feet
 - State ordinances specify no maximum ADU height
- Per AB 2221 and SB 897:
 - Allow attached ADUs up to 25ft
 - Allow detached ADUs within 1/2 mi of transit up to 18 ft
 - Allow ADUs on multifamily properties up to 18 ft



State ADU law Mandatory Compliance Recommendations

ADUs in the Front Setback:

- To allow construction of ADUs where lot size may be constraining, State ADU law exempts applicants from several requirements, if adhering to those requirements would prevent them from building an ADU of up to 800 sf
- AB 2221 has added front setbacks to the list of requirements that can be waived
- If an ADU of up to 800 sf does not fit in the back yard, such an ADU will now be allowed in the front setback
- The City of Paramount should update its ordinance to include this exemption



Options voted on at the two Paramount ADU Workshops:

- Allow larger ADUs to meet a wider range of needs
- Allow two-story detached ADUs by right
- Allow front, side, and/or rear zero setbacks for ADUs
- Allow more flexibility in how people design their ADU
- Allow more than one ADU per lot (not just 1ADU + 1JADU)
- Allow carriage homes to replace driveways in front setback
- Manage parking demand so a space is always free
- Move-able ADUs: allow tiny homes on wheels



Allow larger ADUs to meet a wider range of needs

- Increase allowable size for a two bedroom ADU from 1,000 to 1,200 square feet
- Some cities go higher than 1,200 sf, allowing ADUs to provide for larger family households
- Often paired with allowing two-story ADUs





Allow two-story detached ADUs by right

- Provide flexibility for more ADUs in more situations
- Single-story ADUs large enough for families don't always work in every yard
- A 1,200 square foot, two-story ADU takes up less space in a yard then a 1,000 square foot single-story ADU
- Allow for additional bedrooms to serve larger households

Allow front, side, and/or rear zero setbacks for ADUs

- ADU siting flexibility helps enable ADUs to work in more situations
- ADUs closer to lot lines creates more useable yard space
- Building codes protect life safety, requiring properly-fire-rated walls and other fire mitigation measures of zero-setback ADUs



Allow more ADU design flexibility



- Don't require ADUs to match style of primary homes
- Style compatibility standards were originally adopted to protect the beautiful look and feel of our neighborhoods
 - Most property owners have a strong self-interest in building a nice looking ADU, whether it matches the primary house or not
- What if the primary house is unattractive? Should an ADU that is more attractive not be allowed?

Allow more than one ADU per lot

- Currently, each lot allows 1ADU + 1JADU
- Allow for two full ADUs per primary home
- Existing lot coverage and setback standards ensure neighborhood design compatibility and sufficient yard area for residents



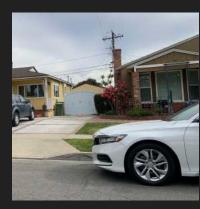


Allow carriage homes

- Allow new ADUs within existing driveway in front setback
- The carriage house is a classic American style, placing an ADU above a garage for vehicle storage next to the street
- Adding an ADU means that more people will be living on the same land, and sharing the same outdoor space
- Replacing a driveway with a carriage house saves the yard for BBQs, outdoor living areas, gardens, landscaping, and play areas for children and pets

Manage parking demand

- Adding extra homes can mean adding cars to the neighborhood
- To reduce the impacts and burdens of this, manage parking demand to allow some spaces to remain available for residents and visitors
- Manage on-street parking spaces through a residential parking permit program to ensure that spaces are generally available for both residents and visitors

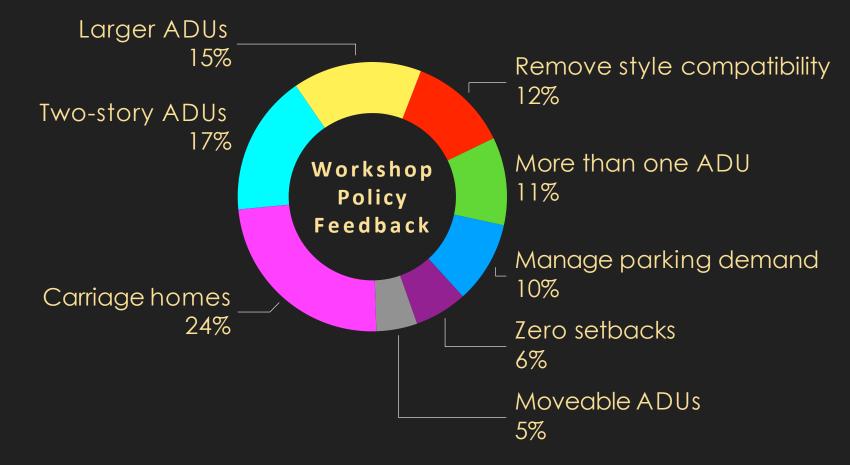




Allow move-able ADUs

- Allow tiny homes on wheels on residential properties
- Allow value-conscious homeowners to add an accessory dwelling unit for a lower up-front cost
- Typically, tiny homes on wheels must be connected to approved utility hook-ups, including water, sewer, and power
- A movable home could be advantageous for a person/household with shorter-term, uncertain, or seasonal needs, such as a student, contract worker, or a project or assignment worker such as those in the building trades or nursing fields

Paramount ADU Workshop Feedback



Results of the feedback from the two in-person ADU workshops held in Paramount. Values represent the proportion of all total votes.

Recommended ADU ordinance Amendments

- Based on changes to state law and workshop feedback:
- Increase detached ADU height allowance to 25 ft citywide
- Allow Carriage Homes in the front setback
- Increase max allowable ADU size to 1,200 sf
- Remove ADU parking requirements citywide
- Monitor on-street parking and be prepared to manage demand with permitting
- Allow 2 ADUs and 1JADU per parcel



HCD-required ADU ordinance Amendments

- 1. Allow ADUs for multifamily dwellings
- 2. Remove garage door replacement requirement for garage conversion ADUs
- 3. Remove references to underlying zoning requirements
- 4. Add "or other detached accessory structure" to Conversion Setbacks
- 5. Add the four additional instances, besides the half mile transit requirement, where parking is not required for an ADU:
 - 1. The ADU is in a historic district
 - 2. The ADU is attached
 - 3.On-street parking permits are required but not offered to the occupant of the ADU
- 4. A car share vehicle is located within one block of the ADU6. Do not require parking for JADUs
- 7. Add attached ADUs as a category of permissible ADUs
- 8. Remove phrase: "corner and exterior setbacks for the zoning designation apply"
- 9. Remove sizing requirements for Detached Multifamily ADUs

RE: Review of Paramount's Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) Ordinance under State ADU Law (Gov. Code, § 65852.2)

Thank you for submitting the City of Paramount's (City) accessory dwelling unit (ADU) ordinance (Ordinance No. 1151, "the Ordinance") adopted June 8, 2021, to the California Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD). The Ordinance was received on July 7, 2021. HCD has reviewed the Ordinance and is submitting these written findings pursuant to Government Code section 65852.2, subdivision (h). HCD has determined that the Ordinance does not comply with section 65852.2 in the manner noted below. Under the statute, the City has up to 30 days to respond to these findings. Accordingly, the City must provide a written response to these findings no later than March 14, 2022.

The adopted ADU Ordinance addresses many statutory requirements; however, HCD finds that the Ordinance does not comply with State ADU Law in the following respects:

- Page 3. Section 17.104.030 Definitions *Definition of "ADUs"* The Ordinance defines ADUs as living spaces "on the same parcel as the single-family dwelling". Effective January 2020, the statute changed the definition of an ADU to add that it may be located on the same parcel as a single-family or multifamily dwelling, as noted in Government Code section 65852.2, subdivision (j)(1). Government Code section 65852.2, subdivisions (a)(1) and (a)(1)(D)(ii), allow ADUs in areas zoned single-family or multifamily dwelling residential use. The City should amend the Ordinance definition to include multifamily dwellings.
- Page 5. Section 17.104.060 Garage Door Removal The Ordinance requires
 that "[i][an attached or detached garage is converted to an ADU, the garage door
 shall be replaced with an exterior wall compatible with the existing dwelling."
 However, local development standards provided by the Ordinance pursuant to
 Government Code section 65852.2, subdivisions (a) through (d), do not apply to
 ADUs created under Government Code section 65852.2 subdivision (e)(1), such
 as an ADU that is created within the proposed space of a single-family dwelling

ADU Approval Process Streamlining Recommendations

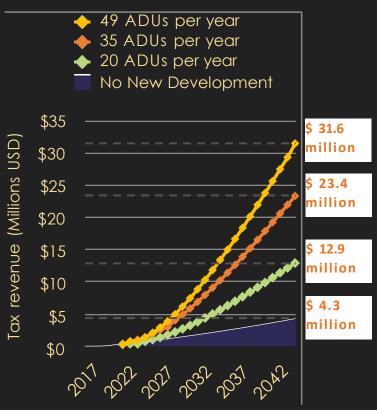
- Based on changes to state law and the ADU approval process audit:
- Paramount currently has a sequential, two-step review and approval process for ADUs
- Convert to a concurrent review process by all departments, including the Planning and Building and Safety Divisions
- Once a complete application is processed and accepted for intake, the application would be sent to both the Planning Division and the Building and Safety Division at the same time
- This could cut roughly in half the amount of time it takes for an ADU application to be approved



Property Tax Reform Recommendations

ADUs in Paramount have the potential to bring in \$17-32 million in property taxes over the next two decades, but almost none of this increase in revenue will come to the City. This point to the need for statewide property tax reforms, to:

- Implement a fix to California's property tax system that assigns a greater share of growth in property tax revenue from new homes to the cities promoting housing development
- City of Paramount should join forces with other jurisdictions in the SCAG region to direct legislative lobbying efforts to advocate for this change
- Work with the League of California Cities (Cal Cities) to lobby for this change



Projected total property tax revenue from ADUs based on four different ADU production scenarios. Nearly all of this revenue is generated for LA County and not the City of Paramount.

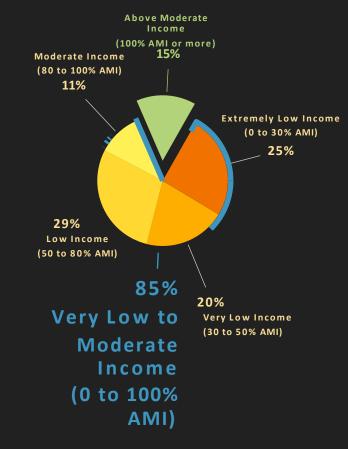
ADU Financing Recommendations

Target ADU financing programs to 85% of Paramount residents who are Low to Moderate Income:

- Support program development to finance ADU construction for low-tomoderate income homeowners
- Support financing program development for homeowners to build ADUs for low-income tenants
- Support SCAG in creating a secondary market for loans for ADUs and other needed housing finance products
 - Such as a Southern California Regional Housing Finance Authority
 - To work with primary lenders, such as credit unions and Community Development Financial Institutions (CDFIs), to make loans for ADU construction available
- Work with Los Angeles Public Bank to provide ADU construction financing
- Partner with a local nonprofit/consultancy to offer free or discounted technical assistance to support the ADU development process
- Lobby for the renewal of the CalHFA ADU grant, or the adoption of a similar financial aid program for ADUs

Work with with the Gateway Cities Council of Governments and the Gateway Cities Affordable Housing Trust to implement these recommendations

Unpermitted ADU Amnesty Program Recommendations

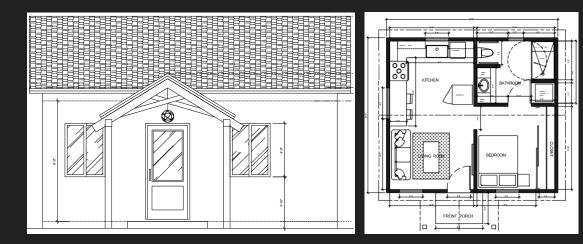
- Update ADU ordinance to add provisions to align with new State law:
 - Delayed enforcement for five years
 - Approval of unpermitted ADUs that do not threaten health or safety
- Streamline legalization process and develop resources for staff members:
 - To efficiently work through complex cases, refer to previous building codes
 - How to most effectively assist homeowners who may be fearful of the permitting process and have unique, complicated cases
- Develop resources for residents:
 - Step-by-step guides, FAQs, and information on fees and financing
 - Conduct free ADU legalization workshops
 - Consider time-limited legalization program within several year period
 - Offer low-cost or free initial inspections
 - Offer anonymous participation option, no risk of penalties or future code enforcement within program parameters
- Continually refine and document legalization process to improve it over time
- Partner with an ADU nonprofit to assist applicants, especially early in the process

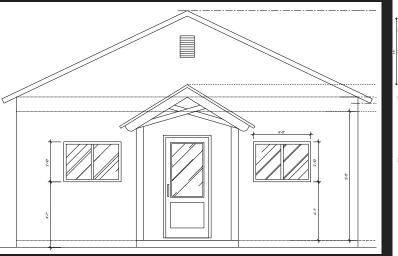


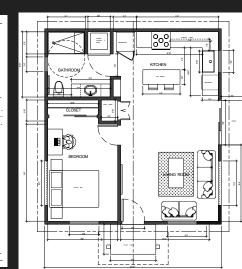
